As with most people, the last two weeks before Christmas are frantic ones for Parliament and its members. Many of the committees have recently reported bills back to the house and others are just about to do so. Once returned from committee there is a natural inclination to complete the usually less time-consuming last few steps to becoming law prior to Christmas. It appears that the recess may well last eight to 10 weeks. Ministers and house leaders are jockeying to obtain priority placings for their own preference legislation.

a respectable legislative record for the first session and the opposition parties are equally anxious to give all bills as close scrutiny as possible. Thus the bargaining gains intensity as the last sitting day, Dec. 21, approaches.

Little fanfare Last week, the House approved third reading without debate of five bills - increasing the baby bonus on Jan. 1 to \$20 per child, tying pension increases to the cost of living, and other social security measures. These changes were made in the form of relatively simple announcements in the House and went largely unnoticed

by the public. In fact, these bills will spend hundred of millions of dollars and provide substantial benefits to millions of low-income Canadiana. The behind-thescenes negotiations were flerce, but obviously satisfactory to all parties as

agreement was reached on

the bills to be included in the

package.


As of writing this, the Election Expenses Bill, which am piloting through the committee on behalf of our party, is about to be sent back to the house. After nearly 50' meetings which dealt with over 135 amendments to the bill, I can't say I am sorry to see it go. However, the Act should be finally passed by Christmas in much improved form over that which was introduced to the House back on June 22.
