Name Carney, Coats to land committee

Dave Green and J. H. Willmott of Milton will represent Milton on the Regional Land Division Committee while P. J. Carney and Bill Coats will represent Halton Hills on the committee.

Neville Chalkley and Tom Marshall of Oakville will sit on the committee as will J. H. McMillan and B. Fletcher of Burlington.

Les Preston, a defeated regional councillor and a veteran of eight years on Burlington Council, will chair the committee.

He defeated Roy Coulter of Milton, P. J. Carney of Halton Hills and T. H. Marshall of Oakville in the election for chairman. The chairman was selected by a secret ballot at the end of the regional council meeting last week.

Members of the committee will receive \$40 per meeting to a maximum of \$1,600 and the chairman will receive a

maximum of \$4,000 per year. Chalkley, McMillan, Green and Carney will serve three year terms while Coats, Willmott, Fletcher and Marshall will have two year
