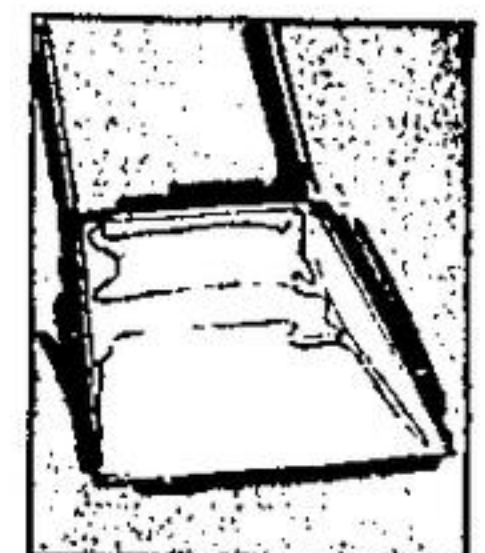
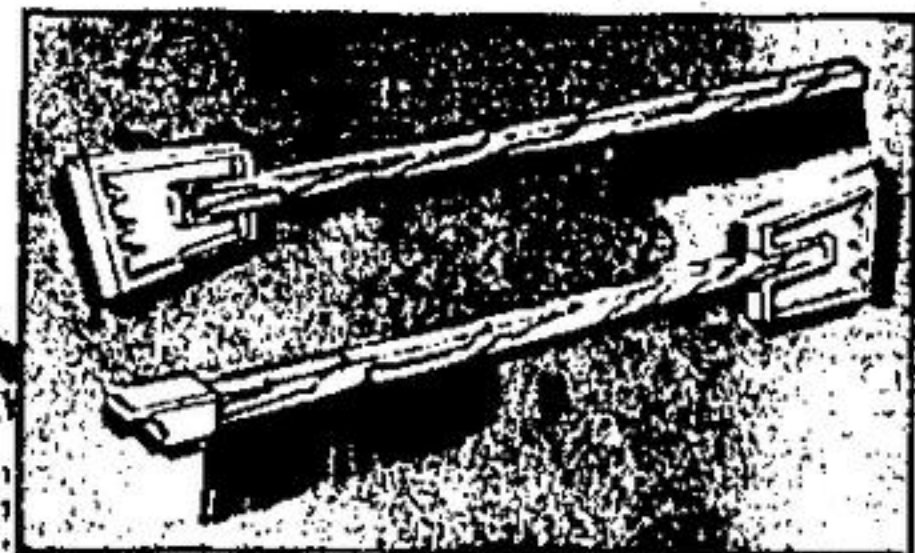

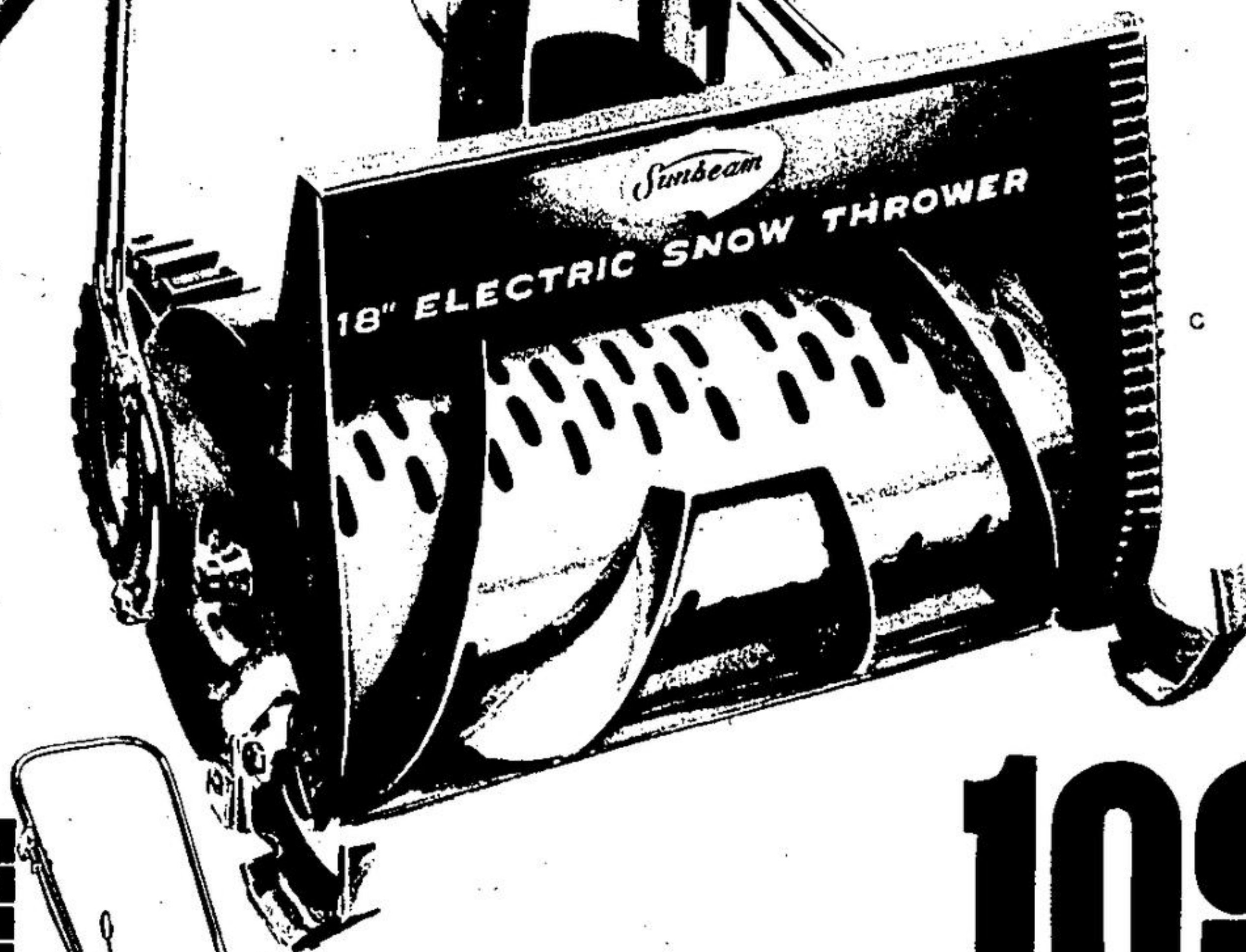

1. Always "Take it easy" when undertaking any snow removal project. Clear-up as much as you feel you're able—then rest. It's the most sensible way.
2. Sprinkle rock salt on any icy areas around your home. Don't let large build-ups of ice occur. They're very hard to melt.
3. A Snow Thrower could save you lots of time. See ours.
4. Here are a few sensible precautions you should follow when using a Snow Thrower. (a) Before placing your hands in the auger area, always ensure that the cord is unplugged on an electric thrower, and that the spark plug is removed from a gasoline powered model. Bonus, raise given to Halton employees

A cost of living bonus, \$16.50 per month, was granted employees of Halton County at the final meeting of the 1973 county council last week. The bonus will be paid to all except those in supervisory capacities or those within a bargaining unit. A payment of \$16.50 will be made for each month of service in 1973. The cost of living bonus was instituted as a means of upgrading the wage rates at Halton Centennial Manor, but county councillors felt all the employees should receive the same benefits.

Langman heads UCO

Tyson Langman of Hawkestone was re-elected President of United Co-Operatives of Ontario at a special board meeting after UCO's 26th annual held at Toronto.

Also elected to the executive were Allan McIntosh of Almonte, first vice-president; Cliff Allen of Glenburnie, second vice-president; and Bruce McCutcheon, former UCO president from Proton.

In a tightly contested election, for group director of zones 7, 8 and 9, Robert Coulthard, a beef feeder and cash crop farmer from Glencoe, ousted incumbent Gord Jack of Bienheim, to become one of three UCO group directors.

The three zone elections held returned former zone 5 and 2 directors, Bruce McCutcheon and Allan McIntosh, and elected a new director for zone 8. He is Royden Bloomfield, who operates a 950 acre mixed farm at Ilderton. Mr. Bloomfield replaces Ken Marshall from Norwich, who retired this year.

Members of Nassagaweya Council authorized the payment of year-end accounts, at their final business meeting of the year, held Friday, Dec. 14.

Little business was done as this was council's "clean-up" meeting.

McKane, Georgetown, has just received a Certificate for Superior Production Sire from the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. The certificate is awarded to bulls whose daughters' average BCAs as based on their first lactation in comparison with herdmates tested in the same season, is equal to a rating of +1 or higher.

Sired by the famous Roeland Reflection Sovereign, Tim has 42 daughters that average 12,740 lbs. milk testing 3.60 percent or 457 lbs. fat in their first lactation. Of his daughters 43 average 136 percent BCA for milk and 134 percent BCA for fat or a DWH rating of +6.
