Reportedly, the board had said earlier that, if possible, the program will be started in three areas - Guelph, at the King Edward public school, Erln area to serve the Erin-Rockwood-Eramosa region, and Allardice public school for youngsters in central and also north Wellington. Increased costs

"The 'if possible' are the key words" sald Mr. Day and reiterated that nothing definite had been set, "Costs will be the big feature," he said. "The administration's view point is to start the student in kindergarten to grade three with total immersion. If this happens our costs will increase as each new class starts up, doubling the outlay as it progresses."

"My personal opinion is that I am not certain that the .. program should be undertaken," he said. "I am more concerned that we are experimenting with five year old children. I'm worried as to how the total immersion plan will affect their learning

in the English program."
The Rockwood man said that, in board discussions. some of the members felt there could be children dropping from the course

after it had begun, "What about those children?" be said. "How can they pick up what they have lost? Where will they fit back into the English program?"

George Day said he was in favor of lowering the grade of teaching oral French, possibly starting at grade five as opposed to seven and eight. "I am enthusiastic about exchange programs in Ontario and Quebec" he continued. "I am also in favor where a student can adapt

of a volunteer French teaching program at a level himself but have the opportunity of personal choice." Mr. Day feets the board would lean towards promoting programs of top priority and in George Day's book the Important subjects on his list are English and mathematics.

At the lost meeting of the Wellington County school board, four members voted against the implementation of the immersion program. Mr. Day said he thought, although information meetings had been held, many parents were not well informed on what French immersion actually meant He said he'd received letters from Hockwood parents who were anxious to have their children participate in the program but preferred to have them kept at the Rockwood school.
