ACTON MINOR HOCKEY coaches received first hand and first rate instruction Saturday from Lorne White, a former University of Western Ontario player and now a member of Ron Smith's O.H.A. technical advisory staff. Close to 50 coaches and managers from Acton and area took advantage of the three hour clinic which drew rave notices from several men with many years experience. White said the response in Acton was better than it has been in any town of similar size in Ontario.

O.H.A. clinic scores hit

Proper use of ice time for practices, fundamentals and proper coaching were demonstrated to about 50 eager Acton minor hockey coaches here Saturday by Lorne White, a member of the O.H.A. technical advisory staff.

The clinic hosted by the Acton Waterloo-Wellington Minor Hockey Association included an hour of slides, a one hour lecture and a third hour of on-the-ice instruction. White, a former University of Western Ontario player and Junior "B" coach emphasized that most of the

progress in hockey at present is being made in the Soviet Union. "Believe me I am not a communist, I am not pro-Russian, but the Soviets are the ones with all the innovative methods right now.

I'm dedicated to improving the brand of hockey in Canada, believe me," he said. White advised coaches that most of the physical conditioning programs for teams can be done off the ice. He said ice time should not be

wasted in exercises when these things can be done off the ice. He demonstrated the use of three simultaneous drills during practice time and also gave tips and special requests from coaches, such as

moving the puck out of the defensive end. The clinic was very well received by Acton coaches, who had to pay only \$1 to register. "I thought I knew a little bit about coaching, but I see I've only scratched the surface," said peewee coach Barry Incoe.

"It's the best dollar I've ever spent," added Doug Legate, assistant coach of the Acton midgets. President Don Lindsay said he hopes to have Level 2 of the clinic here in Acton next year.
