Let's talk about HORSES

Question: How often should my horse's feet be trimmed?

Answer: Farriers recommend hooves should be trimmed every six to eight weeks. If the horse is shod, the shoes should be removed, hooves trimmed and shoes replaced.

Learn to recognize when your horse's hooves need trimming because some horses require attention more often - or less.

In the winter many hooves seem to wear down due to the frozen ground and don't need trimming as often as in the summer. However, make sure the feet are checked periodically for cracks and uneven wear.

One of my horses gets trimmed twice a year whether she needs it or not! But then she's one of those

very rare exceptions who has excellent feet that wear down perfectly at the same rate as the growth.

Many horsemen feel winter is no time to ride and put their saddles up on blocks. However, winter riding can be fun. It's true horse activities tend to be minimal at this time of year but we are fortunate to have better footing now than last winter.

The foot or so of snow does not hinder the horse but does make landing softer if you should happen to need the cushion.

Even if you have an indoor arena, try to ride outside as much as possible. Horses become stale without mental stimulation, just like people. A snowmobile suit may be the answer to cold discomfort but be sure you take time to acquaint your horse with it before you land in a rustling, unco-ordinated heap on his startled back. The horse's reaction is sometimes convulsive.

Another problem to watch for - beware of those gorgeous mild 40 degree days when riding is very attractive. The snow becomes the packing type and hails up in horses' hooves. A sprained ligament can result.

Take care that the long woolly-coated horse doesn't sweat too much and dry him off very carefully before putting him into his stall.

Re-reading this has convinced me that winter riding isn't worth it after all. Will now go and put my saddle up on blocks.

Girth mirth centimeter tape

Sportswear from knits is the latest project for Eramosa Hill Homemakers and last Saturday's meeting, held at the No. 8 schoolhouse, showed complete membership by mothers interested in also learning about the latest fabrics and anxious to assist daughters in choosing the correct materials for their particular sewing piece.

Running in age from 12 to 26 there are 13 girls in the local club all participating in the program of sewing with great enthusiasm. For this term the junior girls are required to make only one item of sportswear from a knit fabric with the senior over 16 girls completing two items or a co-ordinated suit such as vest and pants or shorts and top.

Several items of business dealing with fabrics were discussed and mothers and daughters learned that warp (cut as opposed to weft) was single threaded material with the other of numerous threads. Things to watch for in choosing notions and potential washing and cleaning problems were also matters worthy of discussion.

The meeting became one of mirth when girth measurements were made in centimeters as the girls measured for pattern adjustments with the centimeter tape readings tripling those of the inch.

After discussion, election of officers showed a new executive composed of president Evelyn Eason, vice-president Elaine Donnell and secretary, Susan Tosh.

All in all there will be a series of approximately ten meetings to complete the course which begins at 10

The general administration committee of Halton Hills council is beginning to think it's bitten off more than it can chew.

Chairman Roy Booth raised the question, Monday night, after the committee had plowed through a long agenda, and the clock said 1:54.

He suggested breaking up the meetings into various departments, with planning and municipal properties one night and fire and recreation the other committee night.

Councillor Ric Morrow wondered if the fire or recreation business could be divorced from the administration committee.

The chairman suggested the fire department business ties in with administration more than recreation.

The rest of the committee agreed they may have too much to handle. They decided to talk the matter over with the other committees.

Reject proxy

The general administration committee of Halton Hills council didn't go for any widening of proxy vote legislation, despite a resolution from Oakville council to that effect.

Chairman Roy Booth said any change could be open to abuse.

Councillor Dick Howitt pointed out there are two advance polling days, plus an election day. "I can't get excited about any amendment," he concluded.

The committee agreed with him, and recommended the resolution not be endorsed.

Current legislation restricts proxy voting to persons physically incapable of attending a polling place, persons attending an educational institution out of town, or persons engaged for hire or reward in the business of transportation by railway, air water or motor vehicle.

It must have been the spring but last January 24 meeting of the Sunshine Club was a tremendous success and everyone participated merrily in a sing-song despite the lack of accompaniment.

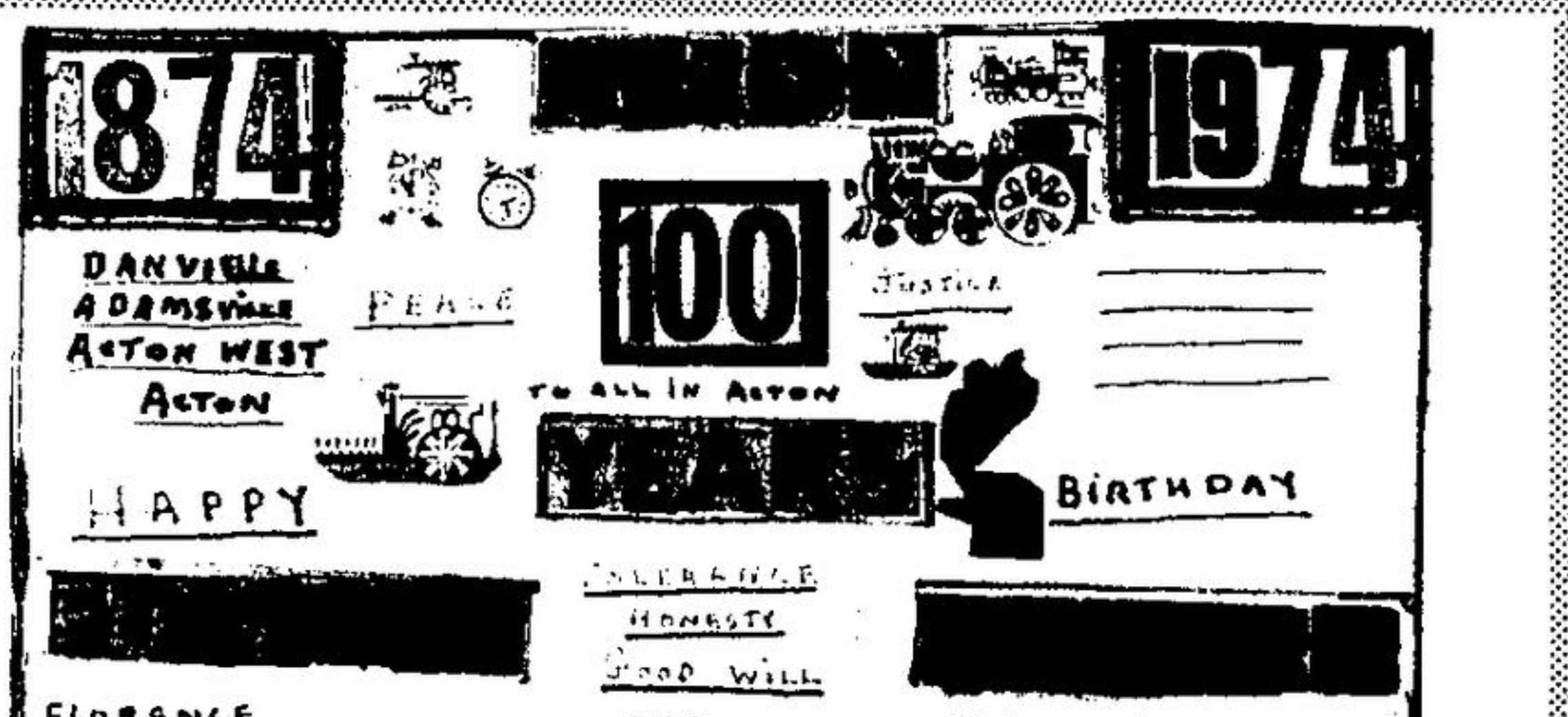
