The local O.P.P. would like to point out Section 83 of the Highway Traffic Act, "Carcless Driving."

"Every person is guilty of the offence of driving carelessly who drives a vehicle on a highway without due care and attention or at Knox college.

without reasonable consideration for other persons using the highway and on summary conviction is liable to a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than six months, or to both, and in addition his licence or permit may be suspended for a period of not

The winter session of YMCA swimming lessons is showing an upswing interest, according to co-ordinator Linda McGrenere who has been organizing the program for the past two years.

"Usually there is a decline in the numbers taking lessons," sald McGrenere, who feels the classes are important for all children and is pleased to see that, instead of the usual winter drop from the fall class numbers, this year's program is being well accepted.


