Day long seminar for councillors

with the Social and Family Services Committee. Doherty explained the role of the family counsellor Friday during a two and a half hour presentation to regional councillors. The presentation was part of an all-day seminar organized by the Community Services Committee to enlighten members of the committee about the services offered and the problems encountered.

Biggest problem
Doherty said that alcohol was more often the cause of family problems than financial difficulties or parent-child conflicts. He told the committee that the four counsellors employed with the regional department dealt with a wide number of problems. Unwed mothers, marital conflicts, single parent families and adolescents with overpossessive parents are typical situations the family counsellor in Halton finds himself or herself dealing with.

Doherty said cases were referred to the family counselling division from schools, doctors, police, courts and a number of other community agencies. Several clients come directly to the counsellors for help.

Poor impression
Mrs. Roddy Fulcher, one of several welfare workers, offered the audience a glimpse of a client. According to Mrs. Fulcher many people have the wrong opinion of people on welfare. She suggested the popular opinion was welfare recipients wouldn't do a day's work even if they had the

chance. She spoke of one man who continually lost jobs he held as a laborer because of poor health. The man's wife was pregnant. He underwent surgery to have a plastic tube put in his leg. During the same time the wife lost the child and subsequently had a nervous breakdown and needed counselling.

The man called the welfare worker recently to say his operation had been successful and he would start work soon as a janitor and would no longer need to be on the welfare rolls. "Some people think the three most beautiful words are 'I love you'. They are not for these people. The three most beautiful words are, 'I'm working now.'"

Other services
Mrs. Martene Swarbrick explained some of the other services the welfare department becomes involved with. These services include subsidizing fees of Red Cross Homemakers, VON visits, day nursery fees and foster child allowances. According to Director Rennie Vivian, the Department of Social and Family Services is often the end of the line for people. He noted his staff often worked with youngsters rejected from their home. He spoke of some cases where individuals stormed the administrative offices and said they'd paid taxes all of their lives and wanted to

Debate expansion

The effect on the flow of water to Hilton Falls Dam by the expansion of the quarrying operations of Dufferin Quarries was debated at Milton Council Monday, as members sought a solution to the problem.

Before council is a by-law, approved by the former Nassagaweya Township, which would zone 92 acres of land marked quarry holding to active quarrying. The by-law must be ratified by the current council to proceed to the Ontario Municipal Board for resumption of hearings.

Milton, however, last year joined with the Halton Region Conservation Authority in opposing the rezoning because of the effect it might have on the flow of water feeding into Hilton Falls dam. Diminished storage in that reservoir, it was pointed out, could affect the mean summer stream flow which would reduce the amount of effluent that could be taken from the town's treatment plant into the stream.

Murray Stephen for the Halton Region Conservation Authority explained the Authority was willing to approve the rezoning to permit quarrying of phase one of the Dufferin lands which would not bisect one of the tributaries leading to the Hilton Falls dam. He suggested this would provide quarrying activity for five to 10 years.

John McCombe, representing Dufferin Quarries, pointed out his firm had made proposals to the conservation authority about pumping and holding ponds. "We feel that any reservoir in the quarry floor which is pumped into the stream is a plus for Milton

Snowmobilers kill swans

Two beautiful swans were killed on the outskirts of Erin, according to the Erin Advocate. Owner Fay Wellington said snowmobilers chased the swans through the 8th Line 100-acre property and caused their deaths on a nearby sideroad.

The Wellington's swans, valued at \$250 were a mated pair. One was recently purchased from the Toronto Zoo.

Mrs. Wellington said she and her husband Stan are conservationists and keep various birds and animals on the property. She refused permission to snowmobilers to use their property for trails.

"Now that the Belfountain Conservation area is closed to snowmobilers, it seems that people are coming into Erin Twp. to use their machines with and without per-

mission."
"One dead swan has marks from a snow machine and is here at our home now. I cannot bear to look at the other one in the ditch on 17 Sideroad."
Allan Gillespie, 10, a resident of the sideroad, found the other swan.
This is not the first time Mrs. Wellington has had trouble with trespassers. She said that once, hunters, stalking deer illegally, shot at her on horseback right on the property. Mrs. Wellington said when they discovered their error, they still were rude to her.
"You can't even ride horses down the roads anymore with the snow machines out. I'd like to form some kind of a committee to do something about this wanton destruction of the environment, but who can help?"
