Two 1836 grain barns to be reconstructed

Two traditional old Ontario barns are being taken apart this week - to be moved and restored elsewhere. The two are on adjoining properties on Highway 25 north of Milton, known as the Peddie farms. The barns are dated at 1836 - or thereabouts.

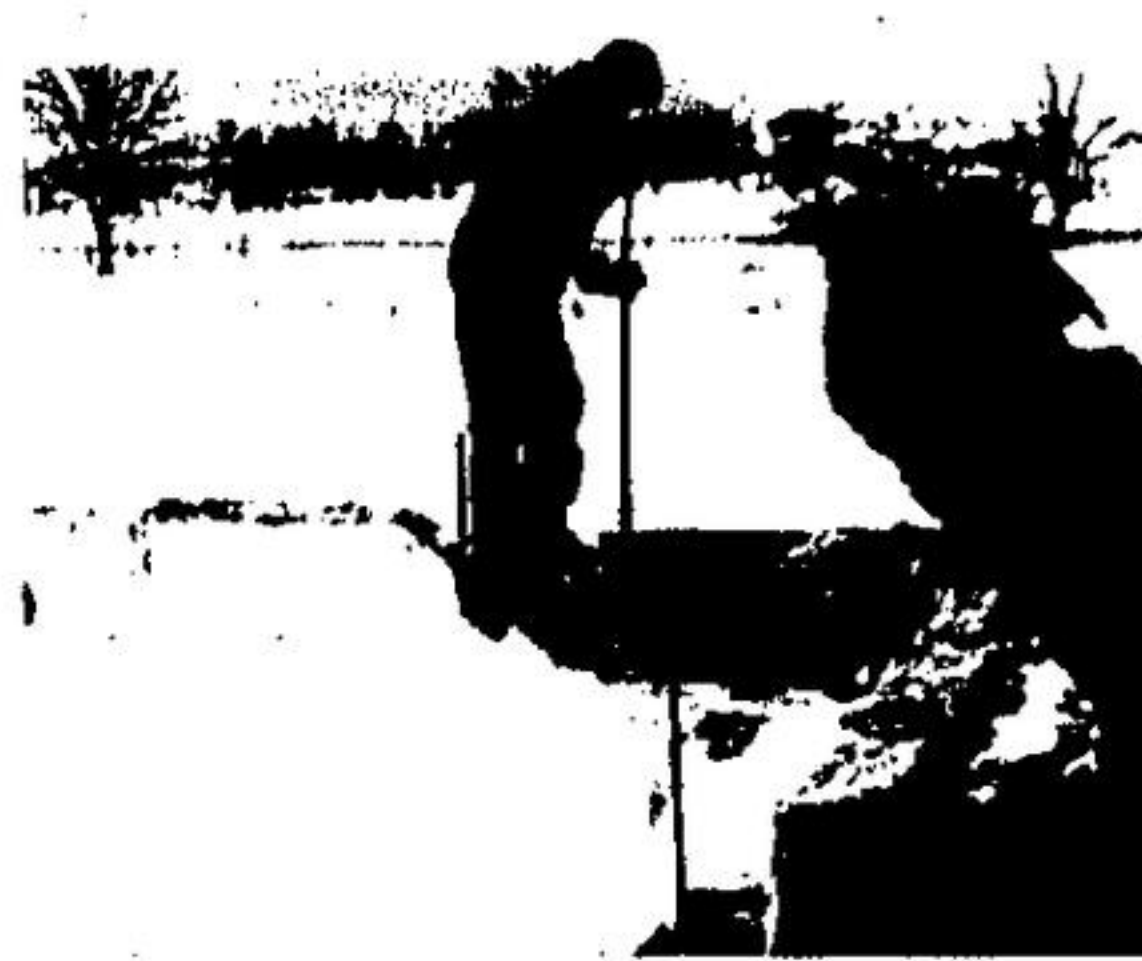
One of them is photographed five times in Eric Arthur's recent book on Canadian barns. This one will be rebuilt by Dr. Bill Greig at his home, R.R. 2, Rockwood, on the fifth line. All the work of tearing it down is "a labor of love" for him. He hopes to have it up again by next summer.

Were common. These were called English or Connecticut barns and were built in this district between 1830 and 1855. They were strictly for grain production, and wheat was exported to the U.S. from such thriving ports as Frontenac, Ankeny and Port Credit to Syracuse and Rochester.

line in those days! Many big houses were built in that prosperous era, too, before livestock production became important here. Then about 1855 Nebraska and Iowa were opened up, and that was the end of Canada's boom in exporting grain.

Pony club busy year

Esquing Pony Club isn't getting older, it's getting better. Barely in its second year, the club has survived a whirlwind birth and active first year.

An auction sale is planned for early May at Penny Lane Farm. This sale, the most successful last year, is the major source of the Pony Club's operating funds. It is open to anyone with anything horsey (from old shoes to saddles) that they wish to get rid of. These items are not donated. The consignor receives the monies brought by items less the usual sale fee. It is this fee which helps to sell the club's meager kitty. Horses and ponies are also consigned at this sale.

Esquing Pony Club formed a team which competed well enough to qualify for the National Pony Club Mounted Games at the Exhibition grounds last August. Such a feat for a first year club is noteworthy.

Other events the club is looking forward to this season are the Western Region Quiz on March 30; the "C" Rally in July and the "D" Rally in August.
