# Public library to open soon

The newly-appointed chairman of the Eramosa library board attended the meeting to present a budget. requested an advance for the purchase of books and to cover immediate general

Expected receipts on the township library were estimated on a 1 mill return per resident from the township which would be approximately \$4,300, plus a \$1.35 per capita provincial grant which would be about \$4,995, with the combined total of money to operate the library estimated at approximately \$9,295.

Cost increase Mr. Gallin explained that, to get the library into operation as soon as possible. it would be necessary to order books immediately and, and the board, at the present time does not have any working capital, he requested that council consider advancing \$6,000, to be paid back as soon as the provincial grants come through.
