Council decides to stay with two chiefs

For a short time Monday night, it looked like Halton Hills might have three fire chiefs, but it turned out to be a subtle method of chastising the administrative staff.

Councillor Roy Booth put a motion confirming a motion put on the books January 7, authorizing the clerk-administrator to advertise for a fire chief for Halton Hills. At this time the fire chief controversy was at its height with the result two chiefs of the two separate areas were established.

Booth pointed out it was a duty passed motion and should have been acted upon by the staff.

Clerk administrator Douglas Pritchard said he had been trying to get direction. "I didn't know if I should advertise for a 'chief of chiefs,' 'an overall chief' or a 'Halton Hills fire chief.'"

Councillor Harry Levy said the motion was out of order. He claimed the January 7 motion should be rescinded or acted upon.

All pay same for dog tags

Some owners of dogs in Georgetown who have already bought 1974 dog licences will receive a two dollar refund if they take the trouble to pick it up at the municipal office.

Monday night, Halton Hills council made dogs in all three areas of the town equal before the law, by setting one price tag on dog tags.

The fees are now eight dollars for male and female dogs and five dollars for spayed females and neutered males.

The five dollar fee is the same as Georgetown was paying but is a two dollar increase for Acton and a one dollar hike for Esquesing.

Acton increase

The eight dollar fee is a two dollar drop for Georgetown and an increase of four and five dollars respectively for Esquesing and Acton.

According to the bylaw passed Monday night, owners must produce a certificate from a veterinarian showing the dog has been inoculated against rabies within two years of applying for the licence.

Councillor Dick Howitt questioned a clause in the bylaw which said a dog will be considered to be running at large when found on a highway or other public place. He pointed out that doesn't help anyone who has dogs running on private property.

Councillors agreed this should be cleared up and passed the bylaw, but will amend this clause to cover the situation.

Hydro route plan

Routest Ontario Hydro has proposed for the 500 kV transmission corridor from the Bruce nuclear development at Douglas Point to the Halton Hills area will be discussed at a meeting in Fergus Thursday, February 21.

Maps setting out possible routes will be displayed. Municipal councils and conservation authorities in the area affected have been invited to attend.

The line will meet a large transformer substation somewhere in this area and then proceed to a point near Milton. The route Hydro favors would go directly through the centre of Halton Hills, with a subsidiary 230 kV, running between the Fourth and Fifth Lines of the former municipality of Esquesing.

Hydro meet

Ontario Hydro will be holding a series of meetings to discuss the 500,000 volt bulk transmission system between the Bradley Junction and the Guelph-Georgetown area.

Hydro officials will present evaluations on the location of rights of way within each corridor.

Of the 12 meetings one will be held in Halton Region, at Brookville Public School March 15 at 7 p.m.
