## Church school exciting Tuesdays at Centennial

After school visits to Rockwood's Centennial school on Tuesday afternoon will reveal that approximately 20 village children thoroughly enjoy weekly sessions of Bible school study under the supervision of Helen McDonald and Syska Drijber.

Song learning, Bible stories, memory-verse reciting, and games of Bible finds, are only part of the hour-long programs which keep children, ranging from kindergarten students to grade sevens, on their toes. Flash cards play their role

and children learn about mission fields in their own back yards. They are encouraged to act out being "little missionaries" by bringing in more people to their classes.

The students are required to apply their skills in discussions and playlets on what they've learned and imaginary swords are used during sword drill games where they must find Bible verses from their own Bibles.

## Cats and dogs poured into Rockwood clinic

From massive Great Danes to miniature Chihuahuas, the Rockwood town hall gounded with animal chorities last Wednesday when over 500 animals were delivered via automobile, legs, or arms, neatly tucked, in anything from ruffled baskets to barren barrels, all in preparation for their annual prod with a veterinarian's needle, man's attempt to ward off dreaded rabies.

Two hundred and eighty-six cats of all colors and breeds, two hundred and some dogs, all sizes and shapes, plus a few lone rabbits totalled a count of 585 animals

receiving the vaccine. Many of those attending were local creatures, well know about the area of Rockwood. Others were visitors for the first time, tripping in from such places as Erin, Hillsburg, Brookville and Eden Mills.

Out of county With rabies reported and Halton Hills not holding clinics, a number of visitors arrived from Acton and Limehouse. Mostly the animals conducted their business with masters and mistresses signing in at the door, to leave quietly on leash or be carried homeward bound. Few stayed long

enough to socialize. Veterinarians urge that, during peak rabies periods, animal owners should have their pets inoculated. Although the vaccine is reportedly strong enough to provide at least two years' protection, the annual inoculation is advocated.
