#### The Study Continues

Over the past year Ontario Hydro has conducted an environmental study to identify the most acceptable alternative locations for each of two transmission line rights-of-way between Bradley Junction and the Guelph-Georgetown area. These rights-of-way are required to accommodate part of the planned provincewide 500,000 volt bulk transmission system as well as associated 230,000 volt rights-of-way in the Kitchener-Waterloo-Guelph area.

#### The First Phase

The first phase of the study was devoted to assembling basic data about the study area from maps, statistics, etc., in order to establish possible corridors for the transmission lines.


#### The Second Phase

To determine the views of the community about the alternative corridors, public meetings were held in October in the study area. Since that time the project team has estabtished a possible right-of-way within each corridor.
