A tragic accident on Sunday afternoon, took the lives of a young Georgetown couple who were to be married May

Instantly killed in a car crash on a country road near Sauble Beach were Sharon Haddock, 20, of 11 Elizabeth St., and her flancee Ted White, 25, of 36 Market St., as they were on their way to visit his parents.

On an icy road, only a mile from his parents' home, the White car skidded into a snowbank and back across the road into an oncoming

The father, Jack White, who had come down the road spotted the Volkswagen and

Sharon was the daughter of Mrs. Marg. Haddock, whose husband Bert dled five years



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
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
