

Young couple killed in Sauble Beach crash

A tragic accident on Sunday afternoon, took the lives of a young Georgetown couple who were to be married May 10.

Instantly killed in a car crash on a country road near Sauble Beach were Sharon Haddock, 20, of 11 Elizabeth St., and her fiancée Ted White, 25, of 36 Market St., as they were on their way to visit his parents.

On an icy road, only a mile from his parents' home, the White car skidded into a snowbank and back across the road into an oncoming car.

The father, Jack White, who had come down the road spotted the Volkswagen and

daughter-in-law had been killed.

Jack White and his wife Gwen lived in Georgetown and Acton before moving to Sauble Beach over a year ago.

Sharon was the daughter of Mrs. Marg. Haddock, whose husband Bert died five years ago.

She was a graduate of Georgetown high school, and was working at Lipton Soup in Bramalea.

Ted, a graduate of Dalhousie University in Sackville, N.B. was employed at Ralph-Clark-Stone, in Bramalea. He was also an artist who had exhibited at shows in the area.

Groups back new arena

"Ten year olds are playing hockey at 5:45 Sunday morning," Jim Buck, president of Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group told Halton Hills council, as he urged action on the proposed arena on Guelph Street.

He claimed all the organizations are poised for action, and are just "waiting to get their teeth into fundraising projects for the recreational complex."

Mr. Buck told council of a joint meeting of various organizations in town, held February 17, where the hockey groups, skating club, Knights of Columbus, Optimists, Rotary Club and Kinsmen club, pledged their support to the project.

The Support group president said house league hockey starts at five in the morning and goes through till 12.15 the next morning. "The parents aren't too happy," he commented. He pointed out one complete league practices in Acton, and some have to practice in Inglewood.

"I hope Halton Hills is not facing a long period of being a split town, as Georgetown was some years ago," he concluded.

In reply to a question from councillor Mike Armstrong, Mr. Buck said one more ice surface was needed at present, but claimed provision should be made for a second surface in the future.

"Have the organizations made any forecast on the amount they think they can raise?" asked councillor Dick Howitt.

Mr. Buck said they were waiting until they had something to work for.

Councillor Ric Morrow said there had been much discussion about a lottery, and suggested he speak to treasurer Lloyd Peterson, who could advise him how to apply for a lottery licence.

"Not for one moment have I ever said the facilities are not needed," stated councillor Les Duby. "It's obvious, when Acton and Georgetown have comparable facilities while Acton has 5,000 people and Georgetown 18,000, but it's a matter of money only."

Councillor Ernie Sykes asked if they had considered having members from Acton and Esqueping on their joint committee.

Mr. Buck said they had not, since the need was in Georgetown. He reminded council in a few years perhaps Ward 1 would need a new arena and hoped the whole town would back it.

Councillor Ern Hyde asked if spectator space was important to the hockey groups.

Mr. Buck replied that the support groups, the Raiders and the figure skating club needed spectators to help finance them. "We're also looking to the future and the possibility of a Junior team, we need spectator space for that," he remarked.

Councillor Booth pointed out that council had never said "Yes we will build an arena, and we'll spend so much." He pointed out no groups could raise money until this was done.

"It would be damned difficult for you to go around giving money back," he commented.

Booth said council had to decide whether they are going to build and how much they would spend.

"The answer to that is—Yes we are going to build an arena if we can get the money," shot back Councillor Howitt.

Councillor Ric Morrow said the capital forecast had been received at the region. He said the treasurer was concerned at the amount submitted by Halton Hills. He said an answer from the OMB was expected within two weeks.

Councillor Ernie Sykes asked what Mr. Buck wanted council to do.

"We'd like some action," replied Mr. Buck. "We wanted you to know there are a great many interested citizens willing to put their shoulders to the wheel."
