## Installation slated for Rev. R. McMurray

Sunday afternoon, March 24, at 3.30 p.m. will mark a main event for members of the congregation of St. John's Anglican church, Rockwood. The service of Mothering Sunday will also include the installation of the Rev. Ritchie McMurray who is well known in the district as the former rector of St. Alban's, Acton.

Married, with four children, Mr. McMurray is, at present, the chaplain of the

University of Guelph, affiliated with St. James the Apostle in Guelph. The rural dean will be the officiate conducting the service. The observance of Mothering Sunday is one which, in itself, has an interesting explanation. It dates from a medieval custom of visiting the mother church of the diocese and, in some parts of England, people made a special visit to their parents and took along a

present of simnel cake. Sunday's service will be held at the church followed by refreshments in the parish hall at which the simnel cake will be served to all the friends, children, guests and congregation attending. "A welcome invitation to everyone to attend," is the word of St. John's and also Rev. McMurray who hopes to see many of his past acquaintances present at the event.

## Building on single lot turned down by council

Permission to install a 2,000 gallon holding tank for building on a single lot was turned down by the Eramosa Township council last Thursday night. The council referred to a letter from the Ministry of the Environment which specified that building on single lots in the village of Rockwood was not feasible with installation of sewerage and water facilities not completed.

Mr. Hills told council he had already been granted permission by the Wellington-Dufferin County Health Unit and that the Rockwood village trustees had also sanctioned the request.

Councillor Jimmie Milne favored allowing Mr. Hills to install the tank. "For one, I think we should," he said, "and soon as sewers go in he's going to hook up anyway."

An earlier letter from the Ministry had indicated that the installation would be completed sometime in '75 or early '76. Mr. Hills had felt it would not be necessary to utilize the holding tank for a period long enough to cause concerns for council.

Councillor Clark was in disagreement. She felt council should comply with the decision of the Ministry of the Environment. Reeve Warren Parkinson said that if the decision to build on single lots was allowed it would have to be applied on a blanket basis, not just restricted to Mr. Hills.

Mr. Parkinson said he could see a number of requests flooding the township if permission was allowed. He said he could see 15 people at the next meeting making a similar request.

"He's already got permission," said councillor Milne who felt that the medical board of health was sufficient sanction for building. Reeve Warren Parkinson said this was not the case. He said the board of health could grant certificates but not building permits.

"The Board of Health is within its rights to give the certificates," he said, "but that doesn't mean we'd be within our rights."

Reeve Parkinson could see problems escalating if, in the case of wells installed too close to neighboring property lines they could become contaminated from other tanks. With the exception of Councillor Milne all members ruled out the request. "That won't stop me!" Lou Hills insisted.

## Builder wants houses on dragstrip

The screeching of tires and the roar of high powered engines may not be heard at Toronto International Dragstrip, in the future.

The controversial dragstrip, which attracted crowds of protesting citizens to Esqueping council chamber in the fall of '69 and for many months after, may be turned into a housing development.

A letter from Dodokin and Sopinka, lawyers for Medical Air Eximites, asked the general administration committee of Hutton Hills, for an exemption from the zoning bylaw to allow the change in land use.

The administration committee recommended that the application be returned, and the applicant told no amendments can be made until the official plan is passed.

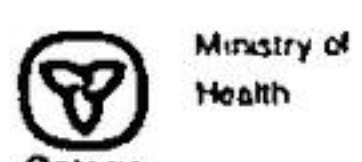
