Need permit to build barns, farm buildings

Building permits for farm buildings will cost the same as permits for other buildings, members of the Milton Council administration committee recommended Monday evening.

The committee was reviewing the different building regulations that affected parts of the town that were formerly in Burlington, Oakville, Nassagaweya and Esquesing.

In the past permits for farm buildings had not been charged, although building permits for other types of construction had cost \$2 per \$1,000 of estimated cost.

Worth price
Building Inspector Ray Olan suggested the permit fees should also apply for farm buildings. "I feel we can be of more help than the cost of the permit," he suggested.

He also pointed out an application for a \$40,000 horse barn required payment of no fee although a \$40,000 home required a fee, which he suggested didn't seem fair.

Provisions for the construction of farm buildings is also to be included under the requirements of the national building code, which makes up the local construction by-law.

About 300 carloads of visitors tramped through the sugar bush at Mountsberg Game Farm this past weekend. Despite the stormy weather of Sunday, 213 cars passed through the gates.

Several thousand pancakes dripping with butter and maple syrup were consumed along with coffee, hot chocolate and donuts.

Maple syrup was imported from a neighboring municipality as recent cold weather has almost stopped the flow at the Halton Region Conservation Authority's maple tracts. It is expected 4,000 school

children will visit the site by the end of Maple Syrup Time, April 7. Between 250 and 300 daily are walking the Tomahawk Trail and riding the horse-drawn wagon to the maple sugar shanty.
