that, in the study, Five Sideroad was earmarked for repair which, in his estimation, was more required on the Fifth Line of Eramosa. Councillor Adsett said he'd like to see the road superintendent Bob Hamilton consider going to 15 or 18 inches of gravel, half at one end and balf at the other.

Superintendent Hamilton told council the road portion of Five Sideroad at the Black swamp was the only portion that really required a lift and that several other places on the same road required ad-ditional drainage work. Reeve Warren Parkinson felt it would be better to have a concentrated effort in certain areas rather than touch-ups throughout the township.

Councillor Adsett contended that the Fifth Line has more continuous traffic than Five Sideroad but that maybe a lift was all required for this year. Decision of council was that a lift of gravel would be put on the top end of the Fifth Line in preparation for resurfacing in 75.

Vandalism reported at station, park gate

Another rash of village vandalism saw the small C.N.R. railway cubicle with windows shattered this weekend and severe damage at the gatehouse in the Rockwood conservation park.

According to Jim Muir, park superintendent, the snowmobile prohibit sign at the park gates was pulled up and used to bash in a targe window at the front of the building and a smaller one at

Telephone wires were ripped out, the eavestrough pulled down, and even the radio antenna on the top of the building was broken. "Plain, unadulterated vandalism," says Jim who can't see the reasoning behind such activity. Police are presently investigating the incident.

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
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
