# Mayor urges fight

Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur urged about 50 Campbellville residents to hire a lawyer and to attend a May 13 hearing before the Ontario Municipal Board. The hearing will deal with Springbank Sand and Gravel's request to quarry lands in the west half of lot six in concession 10 (south of Highway 401 near Campbellville).

She told the delegation the Township of Nassagaweya and County of Halton had opposed any move that would have seen the truck traffic from the quarry going through the village.

She reviewed a number of alternatives the council had proposed earlier and reviewed the outcome of the OMB hearings held in 1972 and 1973. The last hearing was adjourned and the board urged the township council and the quarry operators to meet.

The Mayor noted the township had waited for the operators to request a meeting but to date no meeting has been held.

She noted the township had opposed the proposed trucking route, not the operation of the quarry.
