Capital levies are settled \$600 rural, \$1,205 urban

It will cost \$600 in lot levies to build a home in the unserved rural area of Milton and \$1,205 in the urban Milton if a recommendation on capital levies is approved by Milton Council. The administration committee recommended the levies after reviewing the five different structures now in effect, remnants from the former municipalities that now make up Milton. The committee adopted the present rates for Milton of \$1,205 for a single family unit, \$1,145 for a multiple unit and \$575 for an apartment unit. Under previous structures the levy in Burlington was \$1,100, in Nassogaweya and Esqueping \$500 and in Oakville \$500 although there was some confusion on whether it was applied in Oakville north of the Dundas Highway. A consolidating by-law on the lot levy charges was to be prepared, standardizing the charges throughout Milton. Changes in the first three months of this year had been applied as they were in the former municipalities.

No fee for farm buildings
During a recent meeting, Milton Council agreed to exempt farm buildings from building permit fees. In the past Nassogaweya had not charged but Milton did. Some members felt the fee was in order and that applicants received good advice for their money. Others felt the same advice could be received and should be dropped.
