Before and after the bridge, the Eramosa River should be teeming with fish, according to representatives of the Rockwood Game and Fish Association.

"One hundred 12 inch or longer rainbow were dropped into the river on Sat., April 20," said George Ingle, a club spokesman and, after 20 years of repeat procedure it is expected the Eramosa's fishing produce should be plentiful.

Worm signs
