Council gives nod to pit expansion

Halton Hills council in committee of the whole Monday gave the nod of approval for J. C. Duff to expand his gravel pit operation on the Fifth Line into Lot 24, adjoining his own property on Lot 23.

The final decision must still be made by the Ontario Municipal Board, when the amendment to the Official Plan is requested.

The vote to approve the use of Fred Brooks property for a sand and gravel operation, at this time squeezed through on a tie vote.

The committee had no objection to the extension into the Macassa Mines property, also adjoining the Duff land, since the Macassa Mines site had been mined in the past.

Councillor Russell Miller raised the question of truck traffic through Limehouse, reminding council there had been many complaints in the past. He said this extension covered another 200 acres.

Councillor Len Cox said he went along with extending the Macassa Mines property but was wary of going any further at this time. "We'd be tripling the size of the pit at one sweep," he remarked.

Councillor Ern Hyde said he hoped the pit would be there for 50 years. He said the material is becoming scarce, and people are paying dearly for all the stumbling blocks put in the way.

Councillor Les Duhy said he agreed to the expansion in general administration committee because there is a great need in the community and Mr. Duff explained over 85 percent of his products are used in Halton.

Mayor Tom Hill said truck traffic could use the Fourth or Fifth Line out to Highway 7. He said a trade with the Region was already recommended, where the Region would take over a section of the Fourth and Fifth Line and 22 Sideroad would revert to Halton Hills.

Councillors Cox and Armstrong moved the Fred Brooks property be deleted from proposed expansion, but the motion was lost on a tie vote.

Councillor Miller said he was afraid this approval in principle would be used by Mr. Duff to back his arguments before the Niagara Escarpment Commission and the OMB.

Obituary

Musician, teacher Ken Harrison

Kenneth R. Harrison, North Halton music consultant with the Halton Board of Education and well known organist, choir leader and music teacher, died Friday in Georgetown after a lingering illness. He was 47.

Although ill for the past several months he continued to play a part in the music program for the Halton Music Festival Association in planning materials.

A staunch supporter of the Halton Music Festival, he had been involved in it both as a youthful competitor and later as a music director for the Georgetown and Milton schools. He began with the Georgetown Public School Board in 1952, and continued
