House plans don't need fire dept. o.k.

A recommendation from the administration committee that the fire department okay all building plans, including house plans, was shot down by Halton Hills committee of the whole Monday night.

Councillor Les Duh said it would be much simpler to have the fire chief ask the building inspector to keep an eye on such items. Councillor Ern Sykes claimed the town could end

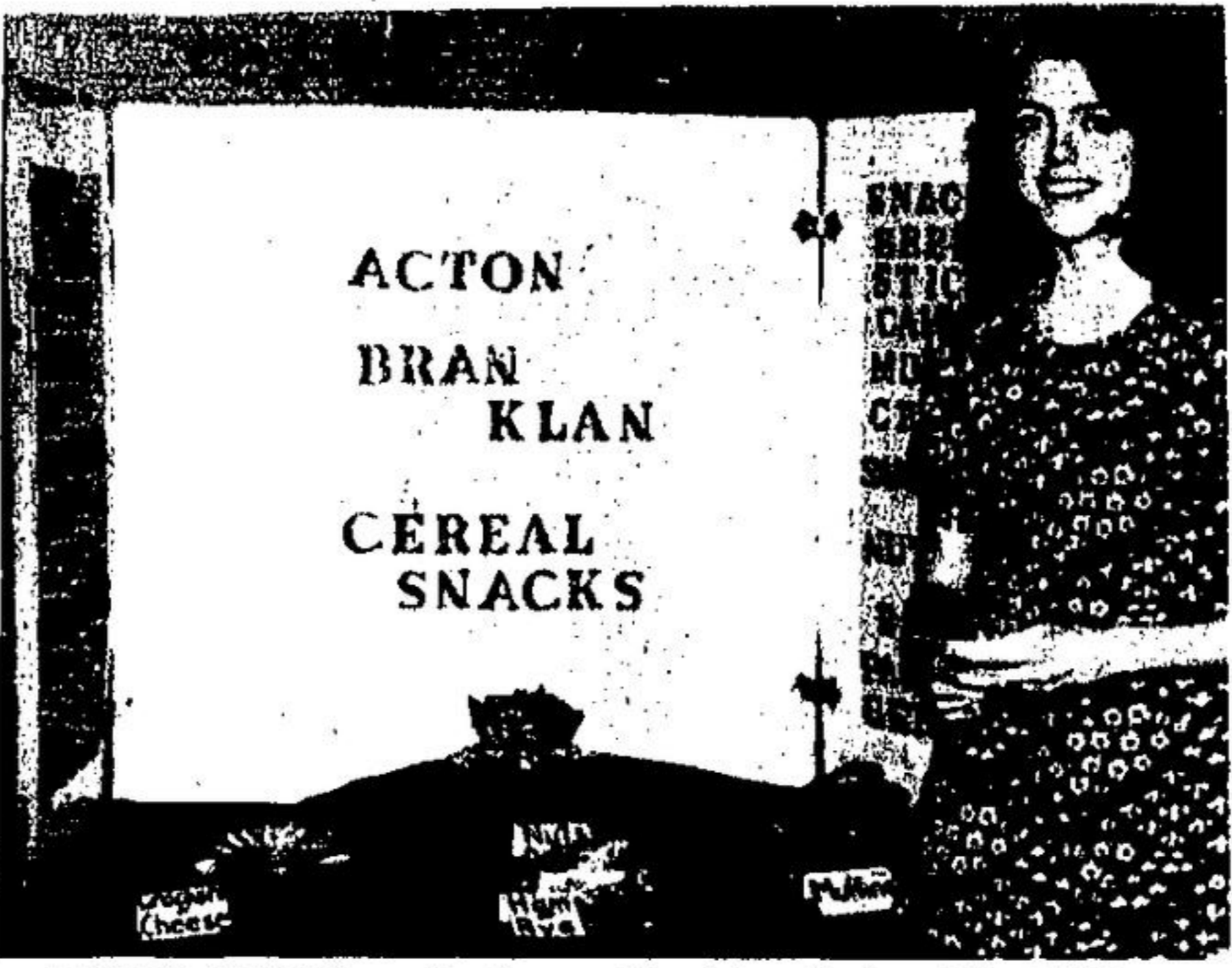
