Against WHA

Guest speaker predicts six game Soviet sweep

The WHA has made a very wise choice in selecting Toronto Toro coach Billy Harris to handle its all-star team which will meet the Soviet Union national team in a six game series in September, but even Harris' experience in international hockey will not be enough to prevent the Soviets from winning the series, probably without a defeat.

That's the opinion expressed by hockey coach Lorne White, a member of Ron Smith's OHA technical staff. White, who conducted a successful hockey coaches' clinic here in January was guest speaker at the Acton (OMHA) Minor Hockey Association awards banquet in St. Alban's parish hall Saturday night.

White told the gathering that if the WHA team is wise, it will begin training much earlier than Team Canada did on August 13 in 1972. He said he believes the Soviets will win because they emphasize team play and because they are playing for their country, which he described as the greatest honor anyone can have.

"I'm not so sure that idea is foremost in the minds of the players in this country," he added. White, who is now helping put together a book on off-ice conditioning explained how the Soviets play soccer to develop skills and take part in gymnastics to develop strength.

"They're going to be very strong in the corners," he said. "I don't believe our players will be able to push them around." White said: "The facts support the theory that we can work our bodies a lot harder than we do." White was introduced by newly-elected minor hockey president Noel Weir and thanked by secretary Judy Shannon who presented him with a gift in appreciation.
