\$1500 too much for brochures

Fifteen hundred dollars is too much to pay for brochures listing the Halton Hills recreation department's activities, according to Councillor Ernie Sykes.

He claimed it would be cheaper to put ads in newspapers. "We're getting pretty fancy," he added.

Councillor Roy Booth retorted, "We're not getting fancy, we've been fancy for a few years." He stressed people have to know what programs are offered.

Mayor Tom Hill said the treasurer had asked the proposed recreation budget be trimmed.

Booth said if they put it off any longer it would be too late

to have brochures printed. Councillor Mike Armstrong said he had a copy of last year's Georgetown brochure in his office, and "it was flowery and attractive, but not worth \$1500."

Sykes moved the item be deleted. He pointed out more than the brochure was covered in the item, and claimed the list exceeded \$20,000. He claimed they should not be considered until the recreation budget was set.

Other items deleted until after the budget is set include the replacement of boards in both Acton and Georgetown arenas with plastic, at an estimated cost of \$12,650, flower planting in public

Moore Park area of Georgetown at \$1500 and the fencing, and line painting on the tennis courts to be built in Emmerson Park, in the

Only Councillors Roy Booth and Les Duby opposed the deletion of the items.

Region's budget cut \$7,000,000 approval sought

After many delays, violent discussions, charges and countercharges, Halton Region has come up with a capital budget well within the \$20,480,000 recommended by Regional Council.

Treasurer Don Farmer released estimates of capital projects after municipalities were asked to reconsider earlier estimates totalling \$25,000,000. The budget now provides for an expenditure of \$18,374,573.

Milton's budget of \$1,097,288 was accepted originally while the other three towns were asked to cut. Oakville refused to cut anything from its \$3,143,665 forecast.

Substantial cuts were made in Halton Hills and Burlington, bringing those budgets down to \$1,030,000 and \$2,175,750 respectively.

In addition to that the region will debenture \$8,932,360 for regional projects.

Those projects in Halton Hills that will go ahead include \$85,000 for a well development in Acton; \$100,000 for a hydro project in Georgetown; \$300,000 for a library addition in Georgetown; \$200,000 for roads in the three areas.

Also included are \$430,000 for an indoor pool, \$1,250,000 for a pollution control plant and \$975,000 for a hospital expansion, all in Georgetown. The budget was expected to be presented to council to day (Wednesday) for approval.

Ratio will not be changed

Halton's secondary school teachers will have to wait a year at least before any changes in the pupil-teacher ratio will be considered by the Halton Board of Education.

About six weeks ago Chairman Bill Priestner introduced a resolution that would see the ratio lowered slightly. This in effect would mean more teachers would be

hired for the same number of children, thus lessening the load on the teachers.

At that meeting six weeks ago the board endorsed a move to lower the ratio at the elementary level but rejected one at secondary level.

Fireworks may be SOLD six days prior to Empire Day, May 20 and Dominion Day, July 1 excluding Sundays.

Family fireworks may not be sold or given to any person under the age of 18 years.

Family fireworks may be SET OFF on Empire Day May 20 and Dominion Day July 1 or the three days preceding these holidays.

Persons 18 years or older may discharge fireworks on his own property or on other private property with the consent of the owner.

When under 18 years of age the person must be under the supervision of parents, guardians or other responsible persons.

Setting off of fireworks is prohibited on public land, roads, buildings, also prohibited in buildings or cars or any place where it would create a nuisance.

The above statements are "without prejudice" and constitute some important interpretations or opinions of bylaw No. 69,1463 of the Corporation of the Town of Acton, which bylaw regulates the use and sale of fireworks and firecrackers within the boundaries of the town of Acton only, and now subject to the jurisdiction of the Town of Halton Hills.
