AHS point total zooms at Halton track meet

Acton High track and field competitors rolled up a total of 117 points as a team at the Halton high school track and field championships at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium, a remarkable improvement over last year when they scored only 21.

Outstanding performances in the field by Maureen Gerth and Scott Withers together with a record-breaking run by Les Jones helped produce the excellent total. Acton placed 10th overall, but the Redmen boys team took sixth spot, outdistancing many larger

schools including both Georgetown and Milton.

Miss Gerth took first place in the junior girls shot putt with a loss of 10.53 metres, second in the javelin and fourth in the discus. She will compete in all three events at the Peel-Halton championships tomorrow (Thursday).

Withers, a Grade 9 student surprised by winning the midget boys' shot putt and placing fourth in the discus.

Jones set a new Halton record, racing to victory in the midget 3000 metres in a

fine time of 9.38.2. Also qualifying for the Peel-Halton meet were Rick Van

Galbraith fifth in the senior long jump and Heather Near second in the midget girls 800.

The school's 4 x 400 relay team which is more used to running the longer 4 x 800 turned in a fine time of 3.39, just six seconds slower than the winning time, but it placed only fifth in the fierce competition. Glen McKenzie, Roger McEachern, Frank Houston and Scott Somerville are members of that team.

Coach Bruce Andrews was more than satisfied with the school's performance at the meet.

"We set 80 points as our goal and we came away with 117," said the coach. "All of these kids have worked very hard and they'll be even better next year."

That summed up Acton Rams' performance in Victoria Day holiday weekend losses to the Bolton Wanderers and Owen Sound Satellites.

Against the undefeated Wanderers, highest scoring team in the Central Ontario Junior "C" league in Bolton Friday night the Acton club checked hard and got top notch goaltending from Gary Turkosz and Jim McNabb in a 10-3 defeat. Bolton had fired a total of 37 shots into the Rams nets in two pre-season games.

Rams however, were able to score only once in each period. Rookie Paul Wilson scored two of those goals and Kevin Marcoux netted one. Lindsay Sanderson had a

hat trick and Bob Noble and Rob Stewart two each for Bolton.

At home Monday night Rams nearly pulled the game out of the fire in the dying minutes when George Artem and Kevin Marcoux scored to cut a three goal Owen Sound lead to just one at 8-7. But inexperience hurt the Acton boys when they came down the floor for a final rush and Owen Sound goalie John McKerrall outgassed them to preserve an 8-7 win for his team.

Bruce Cooksley and Steve Wilson potted two goals apiece for Acton. Single tallies went to Kevin Marcoux, George Artem and Del Watson.

Watson, a big gun with the Midland Hurons last year, hasn't cut loose in the scoring column yet. Del is still travelling from Stayner for games, but when school

closes next month he'll come to Acton. Manager Howard Dwyer expects him to get in the scoring groove then.

Rams have signed blockbuster Ian Sinclair, a late cut of the Junior "B" Hamilton Bengals. Ian is not very big, but he hits very hard, as several Satellites found out Monday night.

Attendance at Monday's game was 133, largest of the regular season so far, but the figure has manager Dwyer concerned.

"We're used to averaging at least 200 a game. I can't figure out why we're not drawing," he said after Monday night's game. "This looks like it will be the most interesting and competitive league we've ever been in."

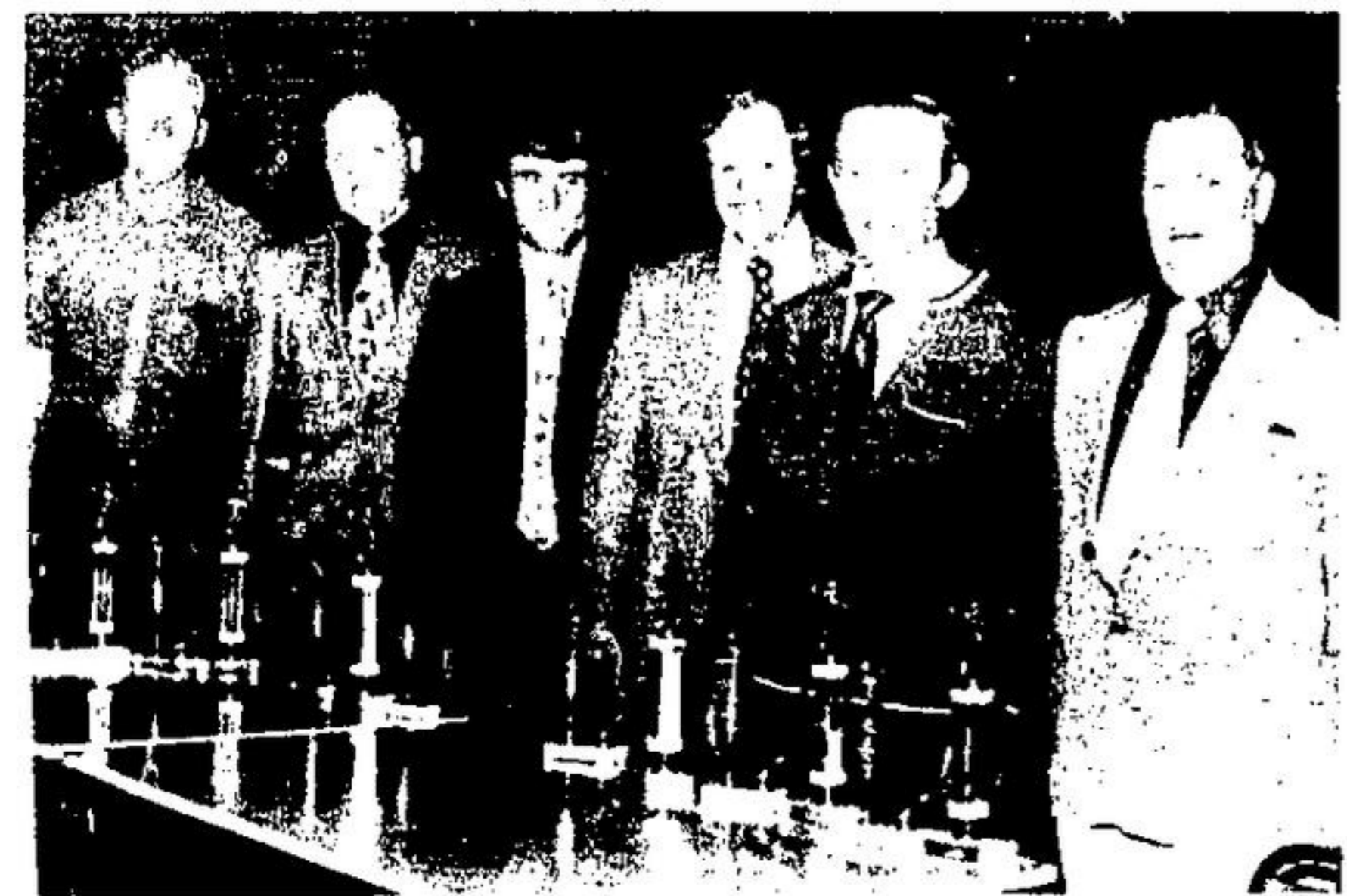
