The following are excerpts from Speyside school's Kindergarten Class of 1973-74.

- KELLY HARRISON'S CHOCOLATE CAKE**

- DENISE HESS'S APPLE PIE**
First you get a pan and put in some flour and some eggs. Take a few apples and pile them on the top. Cook it in the oven for a long time. Give some if you eat your supper all up.
- JANET COLBOURNE'S CHOCOLATE ICING**
You buy a cake and then you make some icing. You spread half the icing on the cake and put the rest on after. You can lick the spoon too.
- ANGELA BLANCHARD'S RICE KRISPIE BALLS**
Put two marshmallows in a pot and then put in some rice
- krispies. Mix it all up with your hands until it is sticky. Put them in the fridge and eat some if it's on your hands.
- JODY DE VRIES' APPLY FLAPS**
Take about 1/2 bushel of apples. Then put some cooking oil in a big pan. Peel the apples and put them in the pan. Put everything on top of the stove in the morning and cook it until 5:30. Make sure you put a curtain in front of it so the smell doesn't get all over the house.
- DOUGLAS BEAMISH BIRTHDAY CAKE**
You take 1/2 teaspoon of shortening and put it in the oven. Leave it for an hour. Put some candles and some pudding on it.
- DONNY McISAAC'S PUMPKIN PIE**
You get a pumpkin out of the garden and you put it in a pie plate. Then you put it in the oven and leave it for 5 minutes.

- SUSAN MacDONALD'S SOUR CREAM CAKE (my version)**
1/2 cup margarine
2 eggs, separated
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. baking powder
1 cup sugar
1 cup sour cream
1 1/2 cups flour
- Add baking soda to sour cream, set aside. Blend butter and sugar. Add egg yolks. Beat whites till stiff and add to the rest. Sift flour and baking powder and add alternately with the sour cream.
- TOPPING:**
1/2 cup raisins
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 tsp cinnamon
- In square cake pan or angel cake pan, place half of batter. Sprinkle with about 3/4 of topping. Then add remaining batter and topping.
- Bake one hour at 325 degrees, covered with foil for the first half hour.
