

# Lorne Scots Cadets hold first inspection

The snappy drill and military bearing of the Lorne Scots Cadet Corps at their first annual inspection, last week, belied the fact they had only been in operation since last September.

Lt. Col. D. E. Egan, reviewing officer, followed by Captain Raj Swaminathan, commanding officer, inspected the cadets lined up in parade formation while the Lorne Scots Pipe Band played. Lt. Col. Egan said later he was surprised to find girls in the corps. "It is the first corps I've inspected with girls cadets," he exclaimed.

The Colonel congratulated the corps, ranging in age from 13 to 18, on the strength of their group. He said most corps are down in numbers, while this one is up. He said he was looking forward to the formation of a second corps in Acton. "You reflect well on your commanding officer, Captain Swaminathan," he concluded.

The commanding officer said the numbers of cadets attending camp would jump this year from five to almost 40 this year. He thanked the corps sponsors, the Lorne Scots Regiment, and the Ontario and Canadian Cadet League, and Georgetown Girl's Pipe Band who put on a rousing display of formation marching, while the skirl of the pipes and the beat of the drums played Scottish airs.

Sgt. Al McQueen, Youth Officer for Halton Regional Police Force, told the cadets and assembled guests that pride, self-discipline and tolerance were the necessary qualities for any successful group. He said "you have changed from a rabble eight months ago when I saw you to a single disciplined unit."

Lt. John Barrett, an officer in the cadet corps and a member of Halton Regional Police force, said it was important for police officers to become involved in community affairs. "There is a real danger we could become insulated from the community," he stated as he thanked the parents for sharing their children with him.

Lt. Col. Egan presented the J. L. Lambert Trophy for the best tumbling demonstration to Lt. Cpl. John Nessel and his Acton team.

Pvt. Richard Hewitt was awarded the trophy for best shot in the corps, and Private Tim Taylor the trophy for best shot in the Acton platoon. Cpl. Tom Gale accepted the award for the top rifle platoon.

Following the awards demonstrations of tumbling, radio and gun assembly, triangulation on targets and first aid were carried out.

The first aid demonstration explained by Tom Massena, used only materials the cadets would have on hand during a field outing.

Among the many guests and parents were Earl Lane, and J. E. Hardy, former C.O.'s of the Lorne Scots regiment. Halton Police Chief Ken Skerrett, Staff Inspector Ray Andress and Staff Inspector Floyd Schwartz represented the police department.
