130 homes proposed for Price property

Eramosa township council spent little time Monday night, discussing the proposal of Alf Perry, of Acton and a consulting engineer from Weston. The two men had brought plans for a 130-home subdivision development proposed in the 50 acre farmland area, located directly behind the home of Vincent Price of Main St., Rockwood.

The homes would be low-income-type housing which would extend behind the Price home from the Eramosa River to Harris St. According to the spokesman, the Ministry of Environment would sanction building such houses to assist in alleviating high sewer and water costs to village residents. The spokesman said the homes would provide living accommodation for 700 people.

To capacity "Our system which we expect to have installed has only a capacity for 1,700 people," said councillor Jim Milne. He said that, by the time Rockwood residents fill their present lots in the village, capacity of the system would be sufficient.

"I understand the facilities are being built to accommodate some 3,300 people," said the consultant. "We think the proposed subdivision would help defray resident costs."

Reeve Warren Parkinson said he'd rather see the people in the village have the opportunity to utilize facilities. He referred to the Official Plan in which infilling in the village was recommended as opposed to subdivisions.

I understood these new homes were supposed to be estate-type houses which would lend themselves to the aesthetics of Rockwood," said councillor Clark. The spokesman said taxation for such homes would not be as profitable as the lower income-type ones he was proposing.

Health unit blamed for septic problem

The regular meeting of Eramosa township council was held in council chambers on Mon. June 3 at 7.30 p.m. All members were present with Reeve Warren Parkinson presiding. Also in attendance were clerk Lloyd Hindley and delegations. The following motions were passed:

—THAT a request by the Rockwood village trustees to open Station St., remain pending until council discusses the matter with the township solicitor;

—THAT the clerk notify the drainage commission granting authority to make the necessary minor repairs on the Hill drain where he feels it essential;

—THAT a by-law to impose a special annual drainage rate upon land in respect of which money is borrowed under the tile drainage act 1971, be given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 18, 1974;

—THAT a by-law to amend by-law no. 11, 1968, a by-law to establish a schedule of vacation with pay for Eramosa township employees, be given the necessary reading, passed and numbered 19, 1974.

Trustee chairman, Gary Bateman, asked council for advice on a notice of eviction which had been imposed on the Beerman of Main St., Rockwood. Mr. Bateman said he understood the Wellington Dufferin Health Unit had placed the notice on the Beerman door Monday morning. The notice gave instructions for the tenants to be out of their residence by Friday. The trustee chairman asked council for consideration for the family who will have difficulty in obtaining a place to stay with such short notice. He said the problem, as he understood it, was malfunction of the septic system, resulting in water contamination.

Council discussed the problem but decided it was one which the Wellington Health Unit should solve. The building in question is a fourplex built by Lou Hills approximately four years ago. Original building permit license was understood by council to have been for a duplex. On completion, the building contained four separate units which had been sanctioned by the Wellington County Health Unit. The building was sold two years ago to Dennis Shea of Port Credit.

A hearing in Toronto could affect higher costs for Ontario consumers if a request by Ontario Hydro meets with approval of the Ontario Energy Board.

Rockwood hydro commissioners learned at their May 27 meeting that cost of power to the village could be upped some 14.8 percent effective Jan. 1.

The Ontario Municipal Electrical Association (OMEA) will contest the cost hike at a hearing scheduled to convene June 10.
