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Calf killed by loose dogs in Eramosa

A story of calf harassment was introduced to council last Monday night at the Eramosa council meeting.

Reeve Warren Parkinson said he'd been called to the farm of M. Macerollo, R.R. 2, Guelph, in Eramosa township, when a pack of four dogs had chased down and killed a prime young calf.

Checking with Mrs. Macerollo she explained that the first knowledge she had of the dogs in the district was seeing a station wagon parked on the roadway near their farm last Thursday. Two dogs which apparently belonged to the car owners were in the front field, chasing 17 last-year calves

around. "They were simply cornering the poor animals and running them down," she said, explaining what had occurred.

Ignored The farmer's wife said the couple from the car were at the fence trying to call them back. "They had leashes in their hands but the dogs were too excited and ignored them". After a while the station wagon disappeared and the Macerollas took it for granted the dogs had been taken away.
