.egislature. Ralton IIIIs, Milton and North Burlington would be one large riding under the new proposals while Oakville and a divided Burlington would constitute the other

Halton is divided into two ridings now-Halton East and Halton West-represented by the Hon. Jim Snow and the Hon. George Kerr, res-pectively. Both M.P.P. have expressed opposition to the proposals which would split Burlington at the Queen Elizabeth Way, leaving a narrow strip between the highway and Lake Ontarlo as a separate riding. Almost two-thirds of Burlington's


