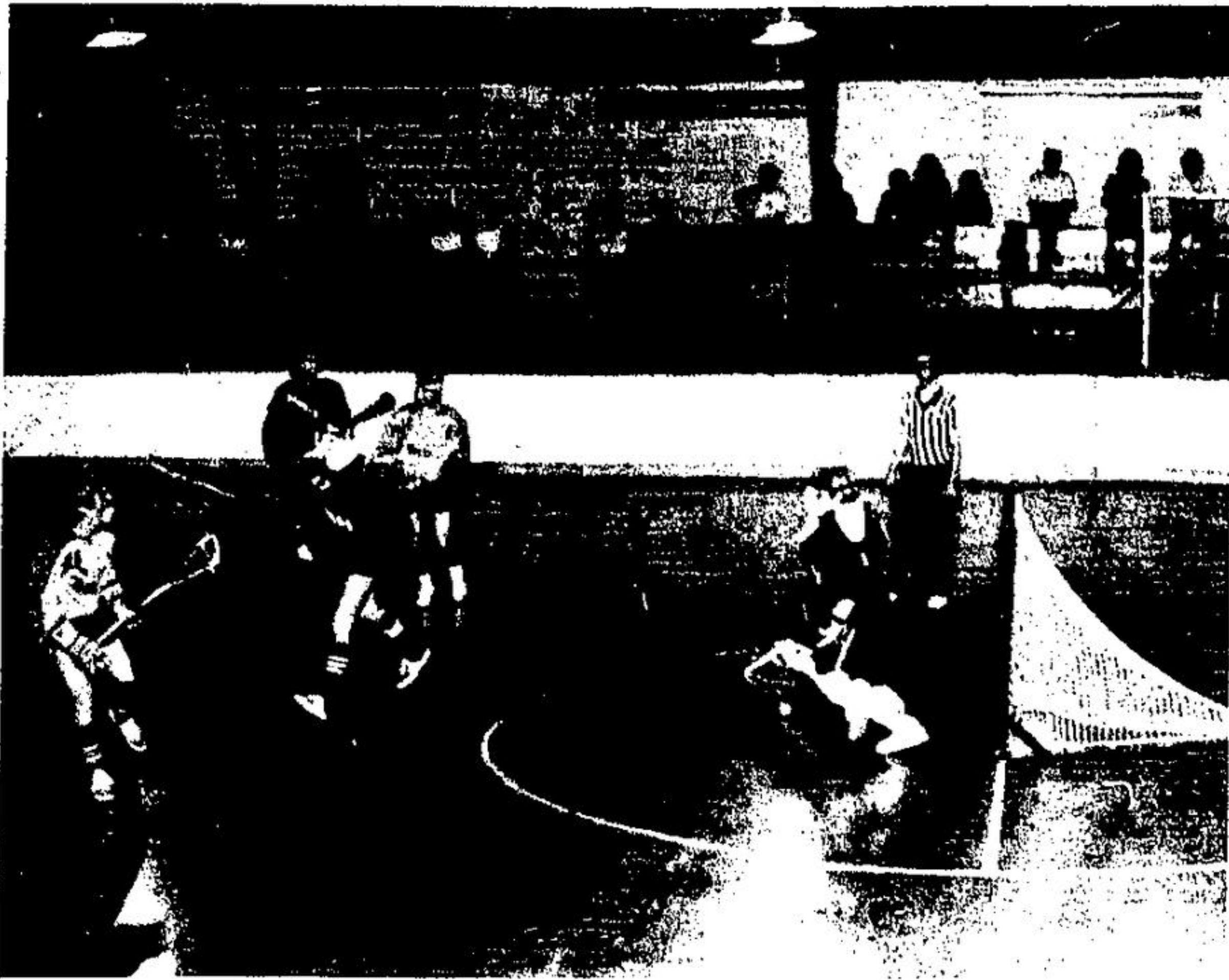


Rams play well, but outclassed by Bolton

In one of their best games of the season Acton Rams were 11-6 victims of the highly ranked Bolton Wanderers in Acton Monday night. Ron Turkosz was the Acton spark plug with a pair of goals while Dave Manes, Kevin Marcoux, George Artem and Steve Wilson all came through with Acton singles. Wanderers wasted no time getting on the scoreboard with a quick blast past netminder Gary Turkosz with 27 seconds gone in the game. Rams held the visitors off until 6:16 when Manes accepted a pass from Ian Campbell and rammed a shot into the Bolton cage. Bolton came back quickly with a pair of goals but Acton's Marcoux was able to lessen the gap when he got a Del Watson pass. Turkosz tied the score for Acton seconds later with a long hard bounce shot from Artem and netminder Gary Turkosz. Wanderers were able to score twice more before the end of the period to take a 5-3 lead to the dressing room. Wanderers chucked in an early second period goal then added another at the two-minute mark to stretch to a four goal lead. Artem counted Rams only second period score when he broke through the Wanderer defense and bounced the ball against Bolton twine. Score another Wanderers scored another before the end of the period and came back with three in the final stanza. Turkosz watched a goal in the early going of the final period from Artem and Paul Wilson with Steve Wilson finishing up the game's scoring for Rams at 19:13 with a pass from Turkosz.

PCO's hammer Rams

Showing no mercy the Mississauga Junior "C" PCO's hammered the Acton Rams 32-9 in Lacrosse play Friday night.

It was the worst loss of the season for the continually souring Rams.

John Stelp led the Mississauga way with six goals, with Sergio Durgien providing four more goals for the home team.

Steve Wilson was Rams' big shooter with five goals while George Artem scored three times. Paul Wilson netted the Rams' only other goal.

Wilson replied Mississauga struck at the seven minute mark of the opening period to start scoring but Steve Wilson replied for the Rams seconds later with help from brother Paul and Del Watson.

PCO's took the lead again but Artem retaliated from goalie Gary Turkosz to put the Rams back into a deadlock.

Mississauga shooters combined for a pair of quick goals as the period lapsed into its second half but Rams came back with goals by Artem and the higher scoring Wilson with help from Ian Campbell and the other Wilson.

Steve Wilson put Rams into the picture in the dying minutes of the stanza from his brother and Artem with the PCO's coming back to knot the score before the end of the period.

Rejuvenated by the between period break Mississauga returned to the floor and blasted four goals past Turkosz.

Steve Wilson interrupted the string from Artem with 7:06 left in the middle period but PCO's came right back to score four more and take a 13-6 winning score to the end of the period.

Artem retaliated Back for the final period Mississauga started quickly but Artem retaliated in the early minutes from Paul Wilson and Dave Manes.

Ram netminder Gary Turkosz succumbed to five Mississauga goals before he voluntarily left the game with 14:09 remaining on the clock. Acton midget Marv McNabb was called up to fill in.

The Wilson brothers provided a goal each in the late going, with passes from Turkosz and Artem to briefly interrupt the PCO last minute spree.
