Who pays for new roads

The possibility of a lot levy to cover costs of opening new streets in Rockwood was considered at the June 3 meeting of the Eramosa township council.

Trustee chairman, Gary Baileman, approached council requesting information on road building in the village of Rockwood. He felt that a tax levy on newly-purchased lots would be a more just way of covering expenses as opposed to the initial road opener paying complete costs.

Clerk Lloyd Hindley was requested to check with the township solicitor as to the legality and method.

council last week was denied by Alf Berry of Altec Construction. Mr. Berry said the 130 homes his company had discussed with Vincent Price were not low-income dwellings but ones that would be an asset to the village. He said they were proposed for 60 and 70 ft. lots to be set at a minimum cost of \$75,000 to \$100,000.

Mr. Berry said, in considering the proposal, Mr. Price was anxious that they be in compliance with village aesthetics and was insistent the area was to be protected.

He said that bridge paths, buffer trees along the river side, and other areas will not be touched but improved. "It appears as though the engineer will be calling for two bridges over a small stream on the property," said Mr. Berry. He explained they will be built at a minimum value of \$20,000 with a park approximately 24 acres placed to preserve the natural setting.
