O.A.C. medal received

O.A.C. centennial medals are being awarded to outstanding graduates in 1974 in conjunction with the 1974 centennial celebrations at the Ontario Agricultural College. Peter Hannam of R. R. 2, Guelph, was an "outstanding graduate" who received the medal. Mr. Hannam runs 550 acres on a cash crop basis and is described as a successful, innovative farmer who serves the agricultural community at large.

A graduate in 1962 from O.A.C., he is well known for his pioneering work in soybean growing in Ontario. Rural education and marketing in agriculture have been prime concerns of Mr. Hannam. Recently, he chaired the three-day marketing symposium between farmers, agri-business, consumers and marketing boards. He performed this task for three years. An active member of

the Wellington Federation of Agriculture which he has served as president in the past year.

Previous to this O.A.C. centennial award, Mr. Hannam won a \$2,000 Bank of Montreal centennial award in '67 which enabled him to travel across Canada and the U.S.A. to study the use of night schools in rural adult education.

Town to pay for swim suits

The finance committee of Halton Hills scanning accounts to be paid, noted there was one item in the lengthy \$32,498.03 list for \$86.56 for swim suits for pool lifeguards. Chairman McKenzie wanted to know why the town was paying for the suits. He said Acton never paid for lifeguards' swim suits. Committee members felt it was questionable but noted the recreation department was trying for uniformity, but they wondered what it could be charged to. Treasurer Lloyd Peterson quipped they could be charged towards beautifying the town.

Road used for storage

Building materials stacked right out on Cobblehill Road, in Acton, are making it impossible for two cars to pass. Councillor Pat McKenzie told Halton Hills Council last week. Councillor Len Cox said the engineer called the company to have the road cleared. "Well, it wasn't cleared this afternoon, I came up that road and there was only room for one car," retorted McKenzie.

Mileage rates undecided

Car allowances for the staff of Halton Hills won't be set until the finance committee of council has more information to guide their decision, it was decided Monday. The committee discussed the needs of employees, rising gas and repair costs, and decided they needed more information before they could set either a fixed mileage allowance or one paid monthly from the average number of miles travelled. Chairman Pat McKenzie said every one agreed there had to be a change and more information was required to do it right.

Police to recruit guards?

Crossing guards in Ward One, Acton, could be recruited to Halton Regional Police if a recommendation from Halton Hills finance committee is accepted. The committee recommended regional police be asked to recruit and enlist school crossing guards since the O.P.P. do not do the job in Acton. Chairman G. W. Pat McKenzie related the trouble he experienced in getting a crossing guard to replace Bill Finley who had suffered a heart attack and was unable to take his job for weeks on Mill St. He said the works department had fulfilled the request in the end but there had been much difficulty. He felt there should be better methods of getting substitutes. The regional police recruit guards in Georgetown.

Receive O.M.B. approvals

Town treasurer Lloyd Peterson advised the finance committee of Halton Hills Monday that the Ontario Municipal Board approval of interim quota respecting two projects under the Winter Capital Works amounting to \$60,000 for the Georgetown library addition (\$250,000) and Georgetown swimming pool (\$430,000) approval was also received for the capital expenditures quota for 1974 of \$1,033,000.

Local resident honored

At the University of Guelph May 23 Convocation, Chancellor E. J. Hall, on recommendation of the Senate, honored Dr. Anthony A. Kingscote by naming him Professor Emeritus. A Rockwood area resident, Dr. Kingscote received his B.V.Sc. and D.V.Sc. degrees from the University of Toronto (Ontario Veterinary College) respectively in 1928 and 1935. The latter for original contributions to science.

A lecturer in parasitology, Dr. Kingscote was appointed professor and head of the Department of Parasitology in 1946. For many years he taught and conducted research in applied protozoology, helminthology and entomology.

Prior to registering at the O.V.C. he had been a sailor and also served with the

Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He served with the Canadian army for five years during World War Two in Europe, Africa and India and subsequently as Chief of the Scientific and Technological Branch, Field Investigation Agency, and British Intelligence Corps.

After retirement in 1962 from the college, he became an international consultant to

the Food and Agriculture Organization of United Nations, serving some three years in the Philippines. Dr. Kingscote has served as the first president of the O.V.C. Alumni Association and first editor of the alumni bulletin. He was first president of the Canadian Arabian Horse Association and, of late, is mastering the art of Chinese brush painting.
