Miss Nancy Knox of Hampton visited through the week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kerr.

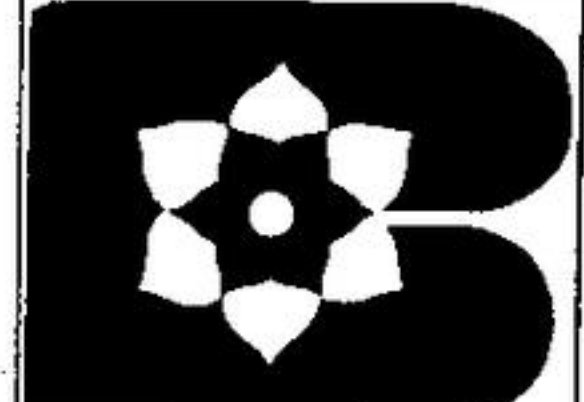
