Also this summer the camp will be offering regular camping for individuals.

Eye clinic for young

Through the combined efforts of the Oddfellows and Rebeccas of Georgetown and Milton, a new service will be offered.

A clinic for the detection of Amblyopia, a condition

commonly known as "lazy eye" will be held in the Legion hall, Georgetown, June 12, in Milton Oddfellow Hall, June 11 and in Acton St. Alban's Church Hall, June 19.

Amblyopia is a condition in which one eye has poor vision, although examination shows no disease nor malformation.

The Oddfellows and Rebeccas of Georgetown and Milton have made the clinic possible by donating an Instant Line Screener, so that vision screening may be offered to young children. It is urgent amblyopia be discovered before the age of six, to prevent permanent vision loss.

A nurse and vision and hearing technicians from the Halton Health Unit will attend each clinic for the three year olds and up.

The clinics in the three towns will run from 1.30 p.m. until 7 p.m.
