

Christmas seals bring \$60,216.33

progressive year of the Halton Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association since it was formed in April, 1951. Reports at the annual meeting reveal contributions to the Christmas Seal campaign were increased 6.3 per cent over last year. Total money raised was \$60,216,33, enabling the association to sponsor smoking withdrawal clinics, condition courses for anthmatic children and education programs on asthma for parents, teachers and the medical profession. Seminars for doctors and nurses on other respiratory diseases

were also held. To date 8,868 people have been tested in the Pulmonary Function Screening program, showing 9.8 per cent to have an abnormality. According to Dr. I.A. Hunter, chairman of the medical advisory committee, "Eradication of TB has been our goal in the past, through implementation of good health measures with the co-operation of all. We are also continuing to advance steadily into the field of other respiratory diseases such as chronic bronchitis, asthma and emphysema, and are becoming increasingly involved in anti-smoking

programs. Unknown

President of the association Mrs. C.W. McKim says, "mention tuberculosis to a roomful of adults and you draw a blank, People know nothing about it and often care less. Many doctors and murses have never seen a case and are now taking refresher courses to learn the latest treatments. But mention asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, shortness of breath, smokers' cough, difficulty in climbing stairs, chest trouble from various kinds of work, and there isn't one who doesn't know of a relative or friend or neighbor down the street who is not affected one way or another. And all are crying out for help. We are trying to give

that help." This year's mailing of Christmas seals was 56,606 letters to homes and industry.



The cancer compaign in Halton Hills exceeded its quota by over \$2,000, campaign chairman June Magnuson reported this week. Quota set for Halton Hills was \$15,500.

Cancer campaign

Mrs. Magnuson attributed the excellent results to the efforts of 600 volunteer workers, the co-operation received from the people of Halton Hills and the news media.

She noted 58 per cent of cancer funds are used for research, 15 per cent for service to patients, 13 per cent for education, three per cent to operate the lodges, five per cent for campaign expenses and six per cent for administration.

In addition to financial support there are thousands of volunteers who give their time and talents during the year to the Cancer Society because they believe cancer can be beaten, Mrs. Magnuson emphasized.

Housing building almost exclusively in the Acton area accounted for \$1,617,732 with 65 houses started.

A medical building in Acton had a permit valued at \$153,000 and alterations amounted to \$12,000. The swimming pool boom

continued with 41 permits issued during May, bringing the total number of pool permits this year to 86. From the May total of

\$1,998,149, the town collected \$4,564 in fees. In the first five months of this year building permits in the whole town totalled \$6,356,839.
