Trailers and the law received by Acton OPP

Trailer season is here and many requests have been received by Acton OPP from confused motorists regarding their operation on our highways. Some of the questions may be answered below:

1. Registration: Before you use a trailer on the road, it must be registered and the license plate must be on the rear of your unit in a clearly visible location. Licenses are available from the Ministry of Transportation and Communications. (This includes home-made trailers).

2. Size: The combination of car and trailer must not

exceed 65 feet. Oversize permits are available from the M.T.C. Your trailer must not exceed 35 feet in length, 13 1/4 feet in height and 102 inches in width.

3. Brakes: If your trailer and load exceed 1 1/2 tons, it must be equipped with brakes. These brakes must be capable of not only stopping but holding the unit.

4. Occupied by Person: No driver of a motor vehicle to which a house trailer or boat trailer is attached shall operate such motor vehicle on a highway if the trailer is occupied by any person.

5. Attachments: You must

have two separate means of attachment, for example your trailer hitch and safety chains.

6. Fenders: Fenders or mudguards must be capable of preventing road spray.

7. Mirror: If your trailer obstructs your vision to the rear, you must have a suitable mirror to ensure a rear view.

For further information contact your nearest police office as there are many laws concerning lighting equipment etc. in the Ontario Highway Traffic Act and Regulations.

Employees of Halton Regional Council will be allowed to attend conventions and seminars in spite of any attempt by Burlington Mayor George Harrington to eliminate participation in any conferences more than 40 miles from regional headquarters.

Harrington said the region couldn't afford to have people out of the building, no matter how incompetent they are. He claimed the seminars and

conventions were of questionable value. Burlington Councillor Pat McLaughlin said the matter of conventions and seminars was a council decision and each should be handled on its own merit. He said the motion before council was ludicrous. "If it is a good seminar and seems to be of benefit like the one the mayor (Harrington) just returned from in Calgary, we should send someone," he said.
