Dinner, dance A dinner followed the ceremony and later a dance at the Ballinacraig Community Centre.

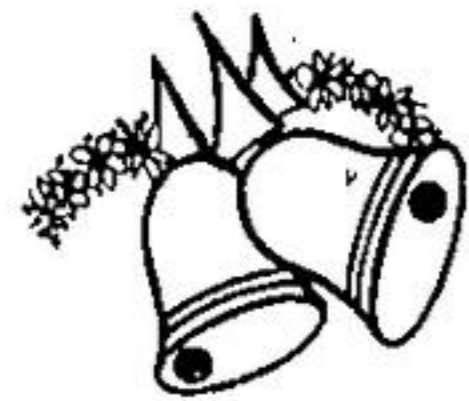
The bride's going away outfit was a soft orange dress in the classic shirt style, belted at the waist with a corsage of white sweetheart roses.
