"My friend, if you weren't here I would have imported you to help me tonight," said lederal Progressive Conservative leader Robert Stanfield to an Oakville heckler at the Halton PC hoopla Thursday night. About 700 people packed the Oakville Trafalgar High School auditorium to see and hear the PC leader.

Stanfield and anonymous heckler traded barbs throughout Stanfield's short prepared address.

The Conservative leader struck first at the rising cost of living and told the overflow crowd it was impossible for any Canadian to save money due to the current rate of inflation.

Stanfield told the crowds he felt it was his "personal responsibility to talk frankly, truthfully and openly with the Canadian people. I said we would be specific about our program and policy."




