

Join forces to oppose freeze

Halton Hills and Milton politicians may put their heads together in an effort to come up with a foint position on the regional planning committee's intent to put temporary freezes on rural lands in the region.

Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur told Milton Council last week that neither Milton or Halton Hills officials were pleased with the prospect of a freeze in the rural areas.


Regional planners have advised the committee stringent controls should be put on residential development in rural areas until the planners have had an op-

portunity to study and determine which areas might be regarded as suitable for estate type development or any sort of housing.

Regret later The planners claim homes could be built right over a water recharge area or in other areas that could later be deemed as regrettable if it were allowed now.

The proposal hasn't been accepted as policy as yet but most members of the planning committee favored the controls being included in the interim policies. Those policies are expected to be in use until the official plan is formulated two and a half or three years from now.


