Obituary George Leslie

The Hornby community was saddened to lose one of their oldest residents recently. Mr. George Leslie passed away at Milton District Hospital on June 2, in his 92nd year.

Survived He is survived by his wife, Jessie, two sons Douglas of Hornby and Dave of Georgetown. There are four daughters, Charlotte McPhedran of Acton, Georgina Brignell, of Richmond Hill, Florence Barber, of Toronto and Catherine Guppy of Oak Ridges. Mr. Leslie will also be missed by twenty-nine grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

Born 1882 George Leslie was born at Ossawa, Manitoba, on Oct. 9, 1882, as his parents, John and Mary Leslie, made their way

to Brandon, Manitoba, from Trafalgar Township, Halton county where they were born. He attended Chesley public school, near Brandon. After leaving school, he began to farm and at one time, farmed several sections of land. He then came east to Ontario in 1914 to visit relatives, returning only once to the west before making his home in the Hornby area.

He married the former Jessie E. Douglas in 1920 and together they celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary in 1970.

Mail Carrier Mr. Leslie was a beekeeper and carpenter. He and his wife carried the mail on R.R. 2 for 26 years. He was a great sports enthusiast and followed the Hornby hockey team many a cold night, (no heated arenas then), to cheer and encourage his favorite team. He was almost as faithful a ball fan. Mr. Leslie was a member of the Hornby Presbyterian Church.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, June 4, from the McKersie Funeral Home, Milton. The Rev. John Murray conducted the service. Pallbearers were all neigh-
