

Anybody who thinks Halton Hills needs a new arena solely because its hockey teams aren't getting enough practice ice time, had better ask themselves how Moscow, a city of 8 million is producing the kind of hockey players it is with only four covered artificial ice arenas?

I can think of lots of good reasons why we should have a new arena, but since I returned from Moscow, lack of ice time for hockey teams is no longer among them.

Jack Greer, the former Acton councilman, who starred on detence when the Acton Tanners were in their heyday tried to tell me the same thing two years ago when I complained that minor hockey teams were suffering because ice was not installed until late October.

"What do you think we used the Tannery filter beds and Fairy Lake for in the middle of winter?" Jack asked me then. He also pointed out that many of Georgetown's outstanding teams of the same era were born on the frozen Credit River.

What makes the Russian hockey system even more intriguing is that they not only use outdoor ice, but also plain old ordinary dry land to do most of their physical conditioning. The National team which will face the V/HA in September, for instance, is already dry land training and, we were told, will not hit the ice until mid-August.

One of the conclusions you can draw from this procedure is that it is beneficial to first prepare players physically for the task, then spend most of the time on the ice practicing skills, something so often forgotten about in Canadian sessions.

Boys playing soccer this summer couldn't be doing anything better to prepare themselves for the hockey season. Basketball, volleyball and tennis are also summer sports with a direct relation to hockey, although many pros may find that hard to believe.
