

Council revokes license

An Eramosa dog breeder who has increased the limits of an original request will now forfeit his right to raise dogs under kennel license privileges, according to a decision of Eramosa township council at their July 9 meeting.

R. Dorgeloo of R.R. 5, Rockwood, originally applied for the license approximately two years ago, presenting its need as a requirement for showing dogs. He was granted the privilege on stipulation he would house only two adult dogs and their offspring for show purposes.

Rights exceeded

Since that time Mr. Dorgeloo has apparently exceeded his rights. Council learned Tuesday that in now boarding dogs as well as raising many more of his own. Letters of complaint indicate he has a great number of dogs on the premises, particularly on weekends when owners board them at the Dorgeloo establishment. Council also learned he is presently building larger runs.

Township by-laws stipulate residents must have at least 10 acres on which to house livestock. The Dorgeloo property contains only one.

Eramosa council briefs

All members of the Eramosa township council were present at last Tuesday's July 2 meeting, with the road superintendent Bob Hamilton and clerk Lloyd Hindley also present.

Victor Jessop, R. R. 5, Rockwood, appeared before council and brought to township's attention the erosion of the municipal drain through his property. He demanded that it be corrected. Council advised Mr. Jessop he would be advised of their decision.

The clerk was instructed to notify Victor Jessop that council will request an engineer from the Grand River Conservation Authority to examine the drain through the Jessop property and recommend a solution for the erosion problems.

Motions passed included: THAT a letter be sent to the saw mill operator of a mill situated near R. Dorgeloo, R.R. 5, Rockwood. A letter received by council from Mr. Dorgeloo contained complaints of the appearance of the debris from the adjacent

mill. Council wrote requesting that the situation be remedied. THAT a special meeting will be held to which Dr. Dale of the Guelph-Dufferin Health Unit will be invited Council have obtained a price on the cost of building the proposed Medical Center in the village of Rockwood. Plans but not costs have been obtained.

THAT the clerk contact Raymond Law to see if he would be agreeable, if council consented to open and construct Station Street east. He would give the township a certified cheque to cover costs before construction commences.

THAT the Rockwood trustee board be notified suggesting it may be advisable unopened streets be done as local improvements.

THAT the application by a ratepayer to the Committee

of Adjustment for a minor variance to operate a welding and body shop be approved subject to the conditions the Committee have demanded. THAT the council hire Ralph Verhagen to mow the grass along township roads at a price not more than \$8 per lineal miles.

Flooding THAT the clerk write a letter to the town of Milton requesting them to take action against one of their ratepayers who built a pond adjacent to the boundary road between the town of Milton and Eramosa township which obstructs the natural water course and is causing flooding to the road on the adjacent property. THAT a by-law to authorize the execution of an agreement between the Ontario Hydro and the township of Eramosa be given the necessary readings and passed and numbered 21-1974.

THAT the clerk notify G. Rowling of Eden Mills that keeping livestock on less than ten acres contravenes the township by-law.

Accounts passed THAT the resolution of George Peres, Ferguson, to supply and apply to the township roads, 25,000 gallons of oil at a price of 12¢ per gallon be rescinded.

During the meeting the resignation of George Martin from the office of weed inspector was accepted with regret. The council expressed their appreciation to Mr. Martin for his past services to the township.

The meeting was adjourned to meet on Tuesday, Aug. 6, at 7:30 p.m. or at call of the reeve.

Inquest held

A coroner's inquest was held at the Wellington county court house on July 4, as a result of a fatal accident on June 19 involving a wide load and a motor vehicle.

The coroner's jury recommended that two police cruisers precede the wide load with the leading cruiser having a "wide load" sign furnished by the mover, prominently exposed on the front.

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
