

# 1,000 oppose gravel operation

At their regular monthly meeting, Erin Township Council:

—Met with Dave Wright who presented Council with a petition of over 1000 names opposing gravel operations in the township.  
When asked what the citizens group did want, Mr. Wright answered "What do we want? We suggest that existing pits be exhausted first, then consider where to go in the year 2000".  
After much discussion regarding the proposed new pits, he asked "What's in it for Erin Township? If the answer is 'nothing' then your answer to them should be 'NO!'"

"It would be a sad thing" Reeve Lloyd Lang commented "if the whole country was run that way."

**Clarification**  
—Met with property-owner Fred Stacey and his lawyer regarding the division of his Concession 10 property lot.  
After listening to the problem, Reeve Lang said "We'd be in trouble if we say one thing and our solicitors say something else. We'd better request clarification from him."  
—Approved Bill Rupk's request to build a house, greenhouse, and barn for two horses on 10.8 acres on Hwy. 24 and First Line.

—Listened to a request from Marae Somerville that the township take over Pleasantview Pioneer Cemetery on the Ninth Line.

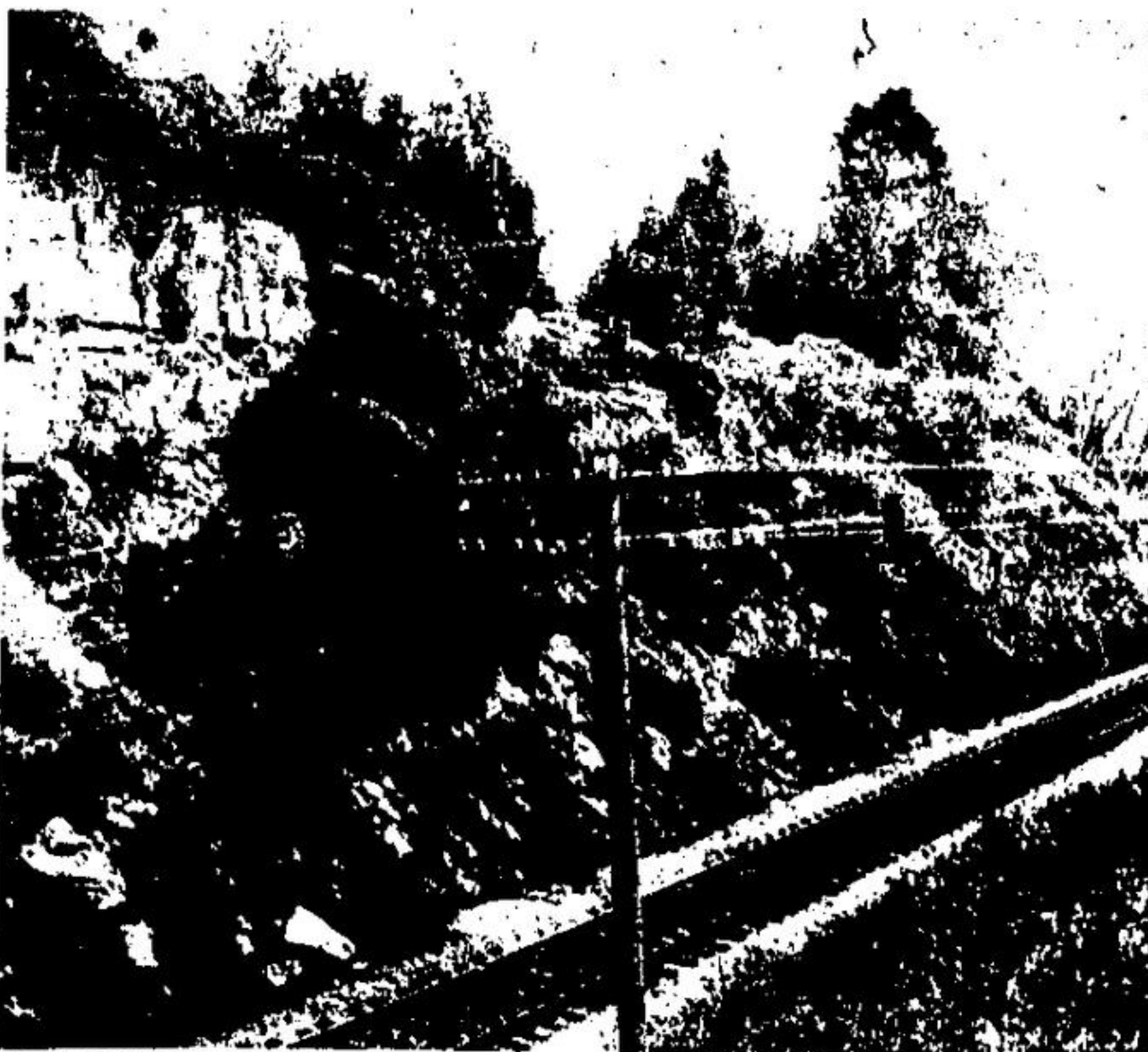
**Didn't conform**  
—Received a letter from a resident's lawyer asking demolition of the garage Bill Reid was building at Ballinafad, stating it did not conform to agricultural use.

—Were informed that the proposed extension of the Community Centre toward the river was not approved.

—Discussed a proposed rabbit slaughterhouse which would process 3000 rabbits weekly. Although the set-up was approved in principle by Wellington County Health Unit, Clerk Elmer McKinnon stated that the owner of the property and not the renter must sign for permits.

—Read a letter from residents Stuart and Bill Smith praising road crews for their work after the heavy rains.

**Raise taxes**  
—Discussed the possible raising of taxes to cover extra road expenses. Roads Superintendent Ed Bardon commented "Nobody ever phones me up to complain about taxes. They just want more of this and more of that."  
—Were notified that the town trustees of Hillsburg had given consent to a Beer Garden at the Potato Fest.

Erin Township Council was asked recently to consider raising their dog tax to discourage dogs on non-farm residences in the township.  
Clarence Brian explained that some of his neighbor's doberman pinschers got loose and chased 27 heifers and one calf. "In this business we count on weight gain. Every pound is important—then the dogs chase the gain off. Maybe that's why so many people quit the sheep business in the area."

As there seemed to be some dispute over the dogs being loose, Deputy-Reeve Donald Matheson pointed out "There's no disputing if the dogs are shot on the job" and Mr. Brian explained by the time the gun out the dogs were gone.  
Since Council and Mr. Brian could come to no agreement concerning payment under the Livestock Protection Act, an appeal will be made to the Livestock Commission.
