

## Park visiting is problem

Contravention of Rockwood parking rules required attention of OPP last Sunday afternoon when several cars were parked on Fall St., some directly beside signs prohibiting parking erected approximately two weeks ago.

The signs were required on the east side of the roadway to alleviate parked car congestion on the street in case of fire truck or ambulance emergencies. The trustees had agreed to put up the signs in conjunction with a request from the Grand River Conservation Authority.

Overflow Sunday's parking overflow showed cars all the way down Fall St. (the location of the conservation park entrance) and, in some cases, double-parked around the block on Mary and Pasmore Sts. Rockwood authorities noted the congestion and the OPP were summoned.

According to the OPP they were called about 5 p.m. They investigated and reported the signs were township authorized and fell under the jurisdiction of the Eramosa township by-law enforcement officer. "We do not enforce by-laws," said Corporal

Haveron of the Guelph detachment.

The OPP contacted Bob Justin of Everlon who informed them he was enforcement officer for dogs only. Eramosa township does not have a parking enforcement officer designated and, at Monday's council meeting reeve Warren Parkinson said he would look into the matter.

THAT weeds should be sprayed in the area of Brady and Queen Sts. and Brace warehouse property on Main St.;

THAT accounts be passed totalling \$7,732.17.

## Neilson's opens centre

Canada's largest candy maker will open their 160,000 sq. ft. distribution centre at Georgetown in early August. Initially 40 people will be employed.

"The consolidation of all our confectionery distribution operations will improve our efficiency," Robert Shropshire, president of William Neilson Limited, says.

The new centre is on the north side of Highway 7 in Georgetown's Industrial

Park, formerly the General Fireproofing plant. It sits on 40 acres with a railroad siding. The distribution centre has a temperature-controlled environment and replaces two Neilson warehouses — one in Mississauga and the other in Etobicoke, both in Metro Toronto. Neilson confectionery will be shipped via the new plant's order-assembly system to customers across North America and to foreign markets.
