A survey of area travel agents indicated brisk business and a shying away from travel in the United States.

Besides Canada and Europe he had bookings for Hawaii, Bermuda, Fort

Lauderdale, Jamaica and the Bahamas.

## It's a fish's life

Over the summer there has been some static concerning the water safety program. I would just like to say a few words about it.

Water safety lessons are held in the mornings during the week. When lessons are in progress at a pool, free swimmers are not allowed. The same goes for our section of the lake. We try to leave an area open for swimmers and we do apologize when we restrict the swimmers during lessons. But, until the time comes that Acton has a pool, the beach is the only place which will facilitate an instructional swim program.

During the afternoons lifeguards are on duty. We are employed through a government grant by the Town of Halton Hills to promote and enforce water safety. Yes it is a public beach, but like officers of the law we are there for the safety of the public.

Rules for everyone: The rule that seems to affect everyone is that one must stay inside the buoyed area. There are two reasons. The first is the danger. The seaweed is bad this year, it is right up to the surface. If someone gets caught in it, it's game over!

The second is distraction. It's like watching over two children, one is sitting on the floor quietly, while the other is putting it's hand in the boiling water. Which one do you watch?

Only takes one. It's the same at the beach. Eyes are glued on one in a danger area. If there are 50 swimmers in the water and one is distracting the guard, what happens to the other 49. We are there to help those in need of it, but the first duty of a lifeguard is to prevent water accidents from happening. I hope this has helped enlighten those who have misunderstood.

Last week marked an historic event for Acton. A

water safety demonstration was put on after the Playground parade. Students from various classes displayed their talents in swimming strokes, skills, rescues, and artificial respiration. It went over very

well. Approximately 200 people attended. The favorite of the evening was the canoe demonstration. Sue Shoemaker (an instructor-guard) and Carole Staley, a student in the survival program demonstrated the

proper way to enter a canoe, exit it and what to do when it tips!

The water safety demonstration was the first of its kind in Acton and I'm sure everyone present went home with a little bit to think about.

With most products you buy you never get to know about the increased price until you reach the cash register. The few pennies added to a can of this or that just seems to happen.

First there's the wholesale power we purchase directly from the Ontario Hydro generating system. This year it will cost us some 15 per cent more. A number of factors have forced this increase to us... rising labour charges, higher construction costs and increases in the cost of practically every industry or business you'd care to name are also affecting the generation of electricity. Our local costs are going up too. Lines, transformers, poles, gasoline for our service vehicles—all these essentials have been rising at an almost unprecedented rate.

In the past, we have been successful in absorbing many of these increases, rather than passing them immediately on to you. However, we've now reached a point where the present rates will not return sufficient revenue to cover costs.

Thus, in spite of the many economies we've made and will continue to make, we must now ask for a rate increase. An increase that will be sufficient to handle the rising costs outside our direct control.

Since 1970, the rates to Acton Hydro customers has not increased. In the meantime through careful management, the Acton Commission has absorbed four increases in the wholesale cost of power from the Ontario Hydro.

While it wouldn't be human to be pleased about any kind of increase, we hope you'll understand our position—and the reasons why we must make this adjustment in rates at this time.
