Acton Rams have finally been eliminated from the Central Ontario Junior "C" lacrosse playoffs, after putting up a stubborn battle in a demanding playoff schedule that forced them to play 13 games in 26 days. Bolton Wanderers won the group championship, ousting the Rams in straight games 13-8, 13-9 and 13-8 in a final series that started in the Orangeville arena Friday night and was over in the Orangeville arena Monday night. The OLA ordered the teams to declare a winner to meet either Six Nations or Point Edward in the OLA Junior "C" semi-finals beginning this weekend. Both teams were near exhaustion at the end of Friday night's series opener after having eliminated their semi-final opponents Owen Sound and Rexdale just two nights before.
