Cutting CAS budget reduces Ont. grants

Regional Conneil's Services Committee will ask the counell to reconsider budget cuts demanded of the Hallon Children's Ald Society. While the regional share of the budwould be reduced by \$5,055 the budget cut would cost the CAS \$18,720.

Cuts made by the region ause automatle loss of grants from the province. The provincial grant is based on the amount of money the reglon is agreeable to raise. To cut \$5,055 from the regional share would mean an overall reduction in the CAS budget of \$18,720.

With the exception of Halton Hills Mayor Tom Hill, the committee endorsed treasurer Don Farmer's recommendation that the committee cut the contribution by \$1,055 reducing the overall cut to \$4,000.

Farmer noted CAS representatives felt they could live with a \$4,000 cut but not an \$18,720 reduction, Hill felt the CAS should live within the budget as established by council. He felt leniency in that case would bring requests from other depart-


