Transfer of children from the Ontario School for the Deaf at Milton has left a dormitory vacant, and the Tinkerbelle organizers are delighted to be taking it over. "It's perfect for our children," says nursery chairman Edith Hillman, R. R. 4, Acton. "Absolutely functional in every way!"

Tinkerbelle classes were in Park School, Georgetown, last term, but there's no more space for them there.

Transfer A new school for the Deaf has been built at London and about 150 children from the Milton school have been transferred there. It left a complete dormitory vacant for the present time, at least. Population increases might necessitate another move, but that's nothing new for the Tinkerbelle staff.

Their long-range hope is for permanent quarters.
